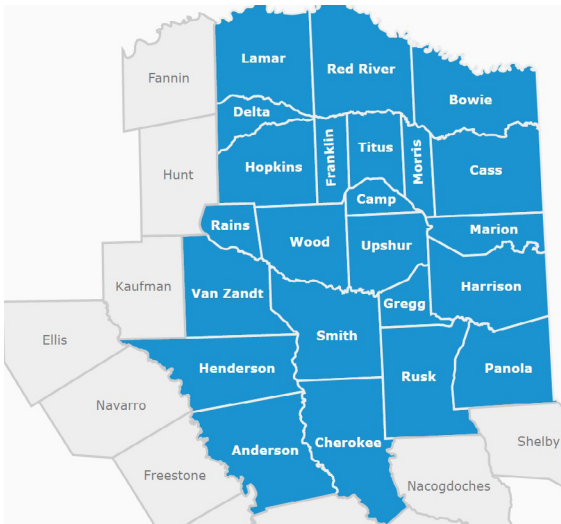
I have been asked for some economic and demographic data on specific counties within our 23-county region during the past couple of weeks. We have **Economic Overview** reports that may be of interest, like they are for peoples who asked me. The reports include a demographic profile, unemployment rate history, wage trends, cost of living index, industry clusters, an occupation snapshot, educational levels, and regional gross domestic product data for 23 counties in East Texas, three designated economic areas (Tyler, Longview, and Texarkana), and a combined 23-county region. The **Economic Overview** reports are updated quarterly and are free of cost.

Figure 1 shows a map of the 23 counties that we provide data for. This is a screenshot of our website. Users can click on the county of interest to obtain a report in pdf form. **Figure 2** shows the front page of the Economic Overview report for Smith County as an example of what you would find after selecting a county.
