Department changes names

A name change for the Department of Industrial Education to the Department of Technology has been implemented at The University of Texas at Tyler following approval of the University of Texas System and the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

Also involved is the change of both the B.S. and M.S. degree programs in industrial education to the B.S. and M.S. degrees on technology.

The request to change the name of the department and degrees was made by UT Tyler officials to more accurately reflect the role of the student, the department and the degrees as each relates to the industry of East Texas

Options of study under the B.S. and M.S. degree programs in technology include industrial technology, industrial safety, industrial distribution, industrial arts education, technical education and vocational/industrial education.

Pittman, who holds the A.S. degree from Tarleton State College, the B.S. degree from Howard Payne College and the M.C.S. degree from Texas A&M University, was employed by E-Systems, Inc. in Greenville as a software engineer prior to returning to the classroom at UT Tyler.

She received her master's in pediatric nursing from the University of Florida and the Ph.D. from the University of North Carolina at Greenboro. UT Tyler Alumni Association bylaws

BYLAWS

Article I Classes of Membership and Annual Dues

Section 1. Active Members — Active members in the Alumni Association shall be classified under four categories: regular members, joint members, sustaining members and life members. Only active members are eligible to hold offices.

Section 2. Dues for Active Members — Dues for active members shall be as follows:

- A. For regular members, dues shall be \$10 annually.
- B. For joint members, dues shall be \$15 annually. This classification of membership is limited to husbands and wives.
- C. For sustaining members, the dues shall be \$25, or more, annually.
- D. Any person who is eligible for membership in The Association and who contributes at least \$100 to The Association may become a member of the Century Club. The \$100 shall be paid annually to retain membership in the Century Club.
- E. Annual dues shall be payable in advance. The fiscal year will run from September 1 - August 31.

Section 3. Permanent Endowment Fund - A life membership is granted to alumni in appreciation of their contributions to the permanent endowment fund, or for outstanding service of achievement in the Alumni Association as follows:

- A. Any member who shall contribute \$1,000 to the permanent endowment fund of the Alumni Association, either in lump sum or in five annual installments of \$200, shall be entitled to, and receive, life membership in the Alumni Association. For the charter year, through August 31, 1983 any individual may become a life member of The Alumni Association with a contribution of \$500.
- B. Joint life memberships shall be presented to husbands and wives when their contributions total at least \$1,500, an amount which may be contributed in a lump sum or in five annual installments of \$300 each.

Section 4. Associate Members — Any person not a former student of the university nor a member of the faculty or staff who evidences a genuine interest in the welfare of the university and who so desires, may become an Associate Member of the Alumni Association. Associate members may pay dues under any of the three classifications (regular members, joint members or sustaining members or Century Club) which they may select and they shall enjoy all the privileges of active membership except for holding office. An associate member who contributes the minimum amount to the permanent endowment fund shall be eligible for election to life membership.

Section 5. Honorary Member - Any person not a former student of the university, who has performed some significant service for the university, may be elected to honorary membership by the Executive Committee.

Article II Elected Officers

Section 1. President — The President shall preside at all meetings of The Association and the Executive Committee. The president shall be charged with the direction of the Executive Committee. The president or president's representative shall maintain liaison with the university through the office of the university designated by the university president.

Section 2. Vice-President — The Vice-President shall preside in the absence of the President and shall perform other duties as may be assigned by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Secretary — The Secretary shall be responsible for recording all proceedings of the Executive Committee and The Association, for handling correspondence and reporting to The Association, and shall perform other duties as may be assigned by the Executive Committee.

Section 4. Treasurer — The Treasurer shall have charge of the operating funds of The Association, maintain systematic accounts and present an annual financial report to the Executive Committee and The Association. The Association shall see that the Treasurer shall be bonded. The Treasurer, the President of The Association and a university liaison representative appointed by the university president will be authorized to co-sign all checks written on The Association accounts. All checks must be signed by at least two of the three authorized persons.

Article III Executive Committee

Section 1. Executive Committee Composition and Authority — The Executive Committee shall consist of the elected and appointed officers, the immediate past president, three elected at large members, and the standing committee chairpersons. The Executive Committee shall not exceed twelve (12) members and shall be empowered to act for The Association in all matters.

Section 2. Transaction of Business

- A. **Quorum** - A simple majority of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum at any meeting. No business shall be conducted by the Executive Committee unless a quorum is present.
- B. **Order of Business** - The order of business may be altered or suspended at any meeting by a majority vote of the members present. The usual parliamentary rules as laid down in "Robert's Rules of Order" shall govern all deliberations, when not in conflict with these by-laws.
- C. **Transaction of Business** - The action of the Executive Committee shall, unless otherwise specified, be by a majority vote of those present.
- D. **Financial Transactions** - The Executive Committee shall authorize the expenditure of funds for budgeted items. Items not budgeted may be purchased through the contingency fund with expenditures not to exceed \$50 a month.

Section 3. Policy

- A. The Executive Committee shall be charged with the direction of The Association.
- B. Matters of standing policy regarding the function of The Association and its programs shall be recommended by the Executive Committee and set forth in a policy manual kept by the President of The Association.

Section 4. Terms — Elected officers and three at-large members shall be elected annually to the Executive Committee. Other positions on the Executive Committee may be filled each year through appointment by the President of The Association. The immediate past president of The Association shall serve as a member of the Executive Committee concurrently with the terms of his successor in office. The term of office for officers and members of the Executive Committee shall begin on September 1.

- A. **Vacancies** — Vacancies in the Executive Committee shall be filled by the Executive Committee.
- B. **Meetings** — (4) regular meetings shall be held each year, one in each of the four quarters. The Executive Committee shall meet on the first Tuesday of each month, unless otherwise specified.
- C. **Attendance** — Attendance at meetings shall be a condition of membership. Failure to attend three consecutive meetings shall result in the member's name being removed from the membership list.

Section 5. Inclusion of University of Tennessee — The Association shall not operate exclusively for the benefit of the University of Tennessee. It shall not be a corporation or share in the ownership of the corporation, nor shall it be used for the purpose of promoting the political campaign of any candidate for office.

Bylaws of The Association may be amended by a majority vote of the Executive Committee.

A fee of \$13.50 per year shall be charged for the study method for the financial planning committee. The

Vacancies - Vacancies on the Committee shall be filled by appointment of the President for the balance of the term.

Meetings - The Executive Committee shall hold four regular meetings each year, with one to be held immediately before the annual Association meeting and one to be held in the fall. The exact date and place for holding meetings shall be fixed from time to time by the President. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called and arranged by the President, or by five (5) members of the Executive Committee. All members of the Executive Committee shall be notified by mail of all regular and special meetings at least five days before such meetings, unless notice of such meeting is waived by members of the Committee.

Attendance - An Executive Committee member who fails to attend at least two meetings in each 12 months, unless excused, shall have relinquished his or her position and shall be replaced by presidential appointment.

Intent - It is intended that this corporation shall exclusively for educational undertakings of The University of Texas at Tyler. No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall ever inure to the benefit of any private individual; no substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be devoted to the carrying on of any other enterprise or otherwise attempting to influence legislation. The corporation shall not participate in, endorse or intervene in (publishing or distributing of statements) any campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

Article IV Amendments

The University of Texas at Tyler Alumni Association is amended by a simple majority vote of the Executive Committee at a regular or called meeting of the Com-

UT Tyler graduate chooses teaching over entertainment

UT Tyler alumna Patrece McLemore Ware is content with what she calls a normal life as a language arts and math teacher at Hubbard Middle School. This might come as a surprise to those who remember when she was first runner-up in the 1975 Miss Texas pageant or remember her singing with the "Harmony and Understanding" group from Tyler Junior College.

Ware began singing at the age of 10 on programs in the school, church and community of Timpson, where she grew up.

"My father was a minister and we all sang in his choir," she said, referring to herself and her brothers and sister. "I took piano lessons, but liked to sing more than anything else."

When she came to Tyler in 1975, she majored in music and voice at TJC and sang with "Harmony and Understanding." The group sang at Texas Stadium every Sunday that the Dallas Cowboys played there during the football season. Other exposure came from singing at Willow Brook Country Club, at banquets and at private ranches in Ft. Worth.

"By the time I came to UT Tyler, I did not see much future in music," Ware said. "I was becoming more realistic and decided to major in education."

In May 1979 she received a Bachelor of Science in Education degree in elementary education. She received a Master of Education degree in curriculum and instruction in December 1981.

During the years at TJC when she was still interested in pursuing a career in music, she entered the East Texas beauty pageant in Timpson. She entered the pageant hoping to win a scholarship.

After winning the local contest, she went on to the state pageant and came in as first runner-up. The first runner-up from all the states went to the National Sweet Corn Festival in Hoopston, Ill. Ware became first runner-up there and won another scholarship.

During her freshman year at TJC, she was asked to sing with country music artist Charley Pride, but turned down the offer to pursue her education.

"I knew even then that you can be realistic or chase a dream," Ware said.

Although choosing to teach, she still likes to sing and perform whenever possible.

In July she was back in the spotlight at the Miss Texas Pageant. She sang several songs on the program during the week of July 4-10 with a television performance on July 10.

"I enjoy performing, but I also love teaching," she said.

Ware is married to Rudy Ware, a Tyler accountant. She is in her fourth year teaching at Hubbard Middle School.

Housing study approved

A feasibility study on student housing which proposes a concept of a two-phase construction program to accommodate a maximum of 608 students for The University of Texas at Tyler has received approval of the UT System Board of Regents.

The estimated total construction cost is \$3,545,632. Board approval of the study allows UT Tyler to pursue methods and or sources of financing for the project. When appropriate financing becomes available, a request for project authorization will be submitted to the board.

The first phase of the construction

would accommodate 380 students within a five-building apartment complex and would include a central commons building. Construction cost of the first phase is estimated at \$8,466,020 for 119,240 square feet.

Second phase of construction would be for 228 students, adding 69,864 square feet in three buildings containing 40 units each at an estimated total cost of \$5,079,612.

Each phase would include combination of efficiency, one-bedroom, and two bedroom apartments to be located on a 17.2 acre tract in the northwest portion of the campus.

Dr. Sorber taught part-time at UT Tyler last year and became full-time at the beginning of the fall semester. She taught 23 years at the University of Wisconsin.

Also moving into the full-time teaching category is Mrs. Daisy Highfill, who has been a part-time instructor of voice in UT Tyler's Department of Music since early in the history of the university. She holds a bachelor's and a master's degree in music from North Texas State University.

A native of Yugoslavia, Dr. Jedlicka joins the UT Tyler faculty from the University of Georgia where he taught the past six years. He has also worked as a researcher for the Department of Health in Hawaii. He holds the B.A., M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Hawaii.

He was a recipient of the Fulbright-Hays award for research and lectures in Yugoslavia, the Sea Grant for research on coastal demography of Florida, Georgia and the Carolinas and was director of the National Science Foundation grant for undergraduate research participation.

Dr. Jedlicka's research has resulted in publication in 14 journals, three books, seven published proceedings and technical reports and 23 presentations at professional meetings.

UT Tyler has child care

A child care program was initiated in August by The University of Texas at Tyler. Program options include full day, half day, full week or two days each week care for children ages 3-5. In addition, elementary age children are accepted from 3:30 - 9:45 p.m. for extended day activities.

Enrollment in "The Children's Place" is open to children of UT Tyler students and to children of university employees.

The child care facility, located in the Physical and Health Education Building, provides an educational program for the pre-school child as well as professional experiences for UT Tyler students in many academic areas.

New education faculty named

Four faculty members who earned their doctoral degrees in Tennessee, Virginia and Ohio are newcomers in the School of Education and Psychology this year.

A graduate of Kent State University in Ohio with a Ph.D., Dr. James A. Schwane came to UT Tyler from the Department of Physiology at Oral Roberts University where he had taught for the past eight years. Dr. Schwane is an associate professor of health and physical education.

His other degrees include a B.S. and M.S. from Southern Illinois University in Carbondale.

Dr. Wanda Elder holds an Ed.D. in special education from the University of Virginia. Her M.Ed. is from the same university and her B.A. was earned at Oberlin College. At UT Tyler, she is an assistant professor of education in the Department of Special Services.

Dr. Elder's teaching experience includes nine years at the University of Virginia and positions in two public school systems.

Dr. Beverly Ann Rodgers, an assistant professor of education, earned her Ph.D. at George Peabody College for Teachers, Vanderbilt University. Her M.S. is from East Texas State University and her B.S.Ed. is from The University of Texas at Austin.

Dr. Rodgers was previously assistant director of the Educational Productivity Council at UT Austin. She has also worked at the Region 7 Education Service Center in Kilgore and taught at Aquinas Junior College in Tennessee and Southwest Missouri State University.

Dr. Olga Fischer, also an assistant professor of education, earned her Ph.D. from George Peabody College of Vanderbilt. She is also a graduate of Colgate University (M.A.T.) and LaSalle College (B.A.). She was a teaching fellow and graduate assistant at George Peabody College while completing her doctoral program.

Robert R. Muntz Library

Ceremony marks naming of library

"Robert R. Muntz Library" clearly stands out as the official designation of the library building on The University of Texas at Tyler campus. In ceremonies held Oct. 9, Dr. George F. Hamm and Mrs. Maurine G. Muntz removed the cover from a plaque designating the official name of the facility. In addition, the name has been placed at a prominent place on the front of the building.

During the ceremony, Dr. Hamm said, "We are here today to officially name the library and to celebrate this occasion which occurs only once in the life of a university. The faculty and students are not the only benefactors of the Robert R. Muntz Library. Tyler and all of East Texas is a better place because of the university library."

Charles Childers, chairman of the UT Tyler Development Board, expressed appreciation to the Muntz family on behalf of the community for adding significantly to the educational and cultural resources of East Texas through the library.

In making the presentation of the plaque to Mrs. Muntz, wife of the late Robert R. Muntz, Dr. Hamm stated, "On behalf of the faculty, staff and students of The University of Texas at Tyler we are pleased to name this facility in memory of Robert R. Muntz who loved learning and loved books."

A special collection of over 500 books were added to the library in honor of Mrs. Muntz and her children. One book, *Texans Who Wore The Gray*, by Sis Smith Johnson, was written in Tyler.

Other books in the collection include *The Quivira Society Series*, a set of 15 volumes, a definitive research series on the discovery and exploration

Enrollment record set

The University of Texas at Tyler has a record enrollment for the fall semester with 2,623 students enrolled, an increase of 666 over the fall of 1981. The fall increase follows record enrollments for the spring and summer terms.

Include in the enrollment of 1982 are 1,432 juniors, 263 seniors and 929 graduate students.

Semester credit hour production also set a record this fall with 21,752 hours. This compares to a previous high of 17,176 in the fall of 1981. The average course load this fall is 8.29.

Females outnumber males 1,601 to 1,022. The average age of the student is 30 while the age of 21 has the most enrolled, 9.21 percent or 242 students.

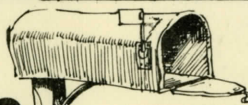

Lecture series inaugurated

F. Lee Bailey, William F. Buckley Jr. and Arthur B. Laffer are the speakers featured during a 1982-83 Distinguished Lecture Series presented jointly by The University of Texas at Tyler and the Smith County Medical Society-Auxiliary.

Bailey, noted defense attorney and author, was featured in the opening program of the series on Nov. 4.

During the spring semester, Buckley will speak on Jan. 20 and Laffer concludes the series on March 10.

Season patron tickets for contributions of \$150 entitled holders admission to each of the three lectures.

As a lecturer, Bailey has appeared before more than 500 college audiences and 1,500 professional groups. He has also appeared as a host for segments of the television show, "Good Morning America."

Buckley, a political insider and analyst, authors a nationally syndicated column and is host of "The Firing Line," a national television program. He was a presidential appointee to the Advisory Commission with the U.S. Information Agency and served as a public member of the U.S. Delegation to the United Nations. In 1982, President Reagan appointed him as consultant to the National Security Council.

Laffer is professor of business economics at the University of Southern California and previously served as associate professor of business economics at the University of Chicago. From 1972-77, he was a

consultant to the secretaries of treasury and defense. He currently serves as a member of President Reagan's Economic Policy Advisory Board.

Smith named dean

Dr.F. Lannom Smith, a charter member of The University of Texas at Tyler faculty, was promoted in July to the position of dean of the School of Liberal Arts. He served as interim dean for 11 months.

Dr.Smith previously served as chairman of the Department of Humanities and Communication. He joined the faculty in January 1973 as an associate professor of English and was promoted to professor of English in 1977.

In making the announcement, Dr. George F. Hamm, president of UT Tyler, said, "Dr. Smith enjoys the enthusiastic support of the Liberal Arts faculty and students. He is highly regarded as a scholar who is deeply committed to the highest standards of academic excellence. Because the quality of a university is dependent upon the fundamental strength of the liberal arts program, it is most gratifying to be able to bring to this office a person with the credentials of Professor Lannom Smith."

Dr. Smith holds the Ph.D. from the University of Pennsylvania, the M.A. from the University of North Carolina and the B.A. from Emory University.
