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## BIDS OPENED AT REGENTS MEETING

The TSC Board of Regents opened bids from six contractors for Phase I construction Wednesday, discussed compromises and alternates and academic priorities, and decided to reconvene at 3 p.m. next Wednesday for a decision.

Apparent low bidder was Allen M. Campbell Co. of Tyler. The firm's base proposal was \$7,392,000 with construction to be completed by April 1, 1976.

With alternate buildings added, athletic fields and other facilities such as parking, the maximum bid from the Campbell Co. was \$9,142,000.

Other bidders were Fleetwood Construction Co. and Zapata Warrior Constructors, both of Houston; Frank J. Rooney Co., Dallas; Texas Olson Construction Co. of Addison; and Loggins Construction Co. of Tyler.

President Stewart and Vice President for Fiscal Affairs John R. Sawyer explained that actual construction funds available are \$7,936,501.

### DR. BARRY GREEN

Assistant Professor of Education

Studies & Associate Professor of Education

Dr. Mayfield received his B.A., M.Ed. and D.Ed. from Texas A&M University in Bryan. He taught for the Palestine Independent School District; was director of industrial education for the Snyder Independent School District; and was a teacher and program consultant for the Bryan Independent School District. He also served as State Consultant for the Texas Education Agency in Austin. Dr. Mayfield was an associate professor at Texas A&M University before he accepted his new position at TSC.

Media Specialist and Instructor of Education

Noah W. McCain attended Texas Wesleyan College in Ft. Worth and received his M.R.E. degree from Texas Christian University in Ft. Worth. He has done graduate work at Kansas State Teachers College, East Texas State University, University of Texas at Austin, and Southwest Texas State University. Assistant Professor of Biology and Chemistry  
Dr. Stewart attended North Texas State University, University of Alabama at Tuscaloosa and received his Ph.D. from The University of Texas at Austin. He taught biology for the Midland Independent School District, Midland, Texas; was concurrently an instructor and graduate student at Sam Houston State University in Huntsville, Texas; was a graduate assistant at the University of Texas at Austin and later became supervisor of biology labs, Division of Biological Science. Prior to his move to Tyler State, he was doing postdoctoral research and teaching at the University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio.

Before moving to TSC, he was an assistant professor of education at Western Illinois University in Macomb.

DR. MARILYN YOUNG

Assistant Professor of Business

Dr. Young received her B.S.B.A., M.B.A., and Ph.D. from the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville. She has been an instructor of business at the College of the Ozarks in Clarksville, Ark.; instructor of business at the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville; assistant professor of business at Southeastern Louisiana University in Hammond; and assistant professor of business, Off-Campus Graduate Program, University of Arkansas at Little Rock.

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Subtracting about \$200,000 for a contingencies fund would leave \$7,736,501. This would be approximately \$1million short of enough funds to build all of the alternate facilities.

Dr. Stewart said that the board and administration were not completely surprised but were disappointed because of the shortage of appropriated funds.

He mentioned that the shortage of funds were due primarily because of the economic situation over the past several months. He said that this is why nine alternates were taken with the base bid proposal.

The regents voted to recess the meeting until next Wednesday. During the week they will be trying to determine what alternates on the bid tabulation table plus the base proposal would provide the best Phase I construction program.

Dr. Stewart met Thursday with Dr. J. Paxton Hart, president of the Faculty Senate, and Dr. Carl Roddy, chairman of the physical plant committee of the Faculty Senate, to explain the details of the regents meeting so they could relate the information to other members of the faculty.

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
