An aerial view of Woldert Cannery in Lindale in the late 1940s. J. W. Ogburn is believed to have founded the first cannery in Lindale in 1895. He left the business about 1910 and was succeeded by his nephew John Stone Ogburn who founded Lindale Canning Company. By the 1930s the operation was called Ogburn Canning Company,

packaging strawberries, peaches, sweet potatoes, and especially blackberries. The factory stood partially on the railroad right-ofway, west of the tracks and 600 feet north of the depot.

Ogburn sold his interest in the business in 1938. Woldert Canning Company acquired the operations in

the mid-1940s.

Early Lindale Businesses COMPILED BY VICKI BETTS

The Mercantile Agency Reference Book ..., published semiannually by R. G. Dun & Co. of New York, attempted to rate the creditworthiness of all businesses in every Texas community. Many early volumes are housed in the Barker Texas History Center on the University of Texas campus in Austin. Various issues from 1880 to 1897 were abstracted for the businesses in Lindale. Information included the name of the firm, type of business, and, when sufficient information allowed, a letter and number rating.

The letter represented "Estimated Pecuniary Strength."

F = \$10-20,000G = \$5-10,000H = \$3-5,000K = \$1-2,000L = under \$1,000

M = under \$500

The number represented "General Credit."

3 = Good3 1/2 = Fair4 = Limited

The publication also estimated the population of the town as 120 in 1880, 50 in 1882, 100 in 1885-1887, 150 in 1889, and 500 in 1891-1897.



This ornate title block shows the artistic and the scientific abilities of Eliab Horatio Wells at age 52 when he prepared "Wells' New Map of the City of Tyler, Texas" in 1888. Some eight years earlier, as City Engineer, Mr. Wells had completely resurveyed the entire original "town of Tyler" by re-establishing the Southwest Corner of that first 100 acre tract sold by E. A. Pollett on February 6, 1847. (For the full report by Mr. Wells to the Tyler

City Council, see Chronicles of Smith
County, Texas, Vol. 12, Issue 2, Winter
1973.) Dr. Wells was paid \$56.00 for the
full survey which had divulged many errors,
variations in bearings and overages/underages in length. The Wells' map included
not only blocks and lots, but added many
details on public buildings, schools and
store buildings. Copies of this 1888 map
are available from the Society.
