COORDINATING BOARD STAFF TO REVIEW ROLE AND SCOPE OF TEXAS EASTERN

Three staff representatives of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, will visit Texas Eastern University Monday afternoon to review the role and scope of the university.

Dr. Francis Phillips, a member of the Division of Program Development staff, will be heading the visiting officials. They will be meeting with Dr. James H. Stewart, Jr., Dr. Donald M. Anthony and John Sawyer in the conference room, beginning at 1 p.m. Other members of the Administrative Council will be involved during the afternoon conference.

An invitation has been extended to Ralph Spence, a newly appointed member of the Coordinating Board, to attend the session.

The visit, to deal with projections for the next five years, is being made in accordance with the charge given to the Coordinating Board by the 64th Texas Legislature which requires the Coordinating Board to study the role and scope of each state institution of higher learning in Texas.

TEU APPROVED AS TESTING CENTER

Texas Eastern University has been approved to serve as a testing center for Educational Testing Service, Princeton, N.J., according to Tom G. Turns.

Trial basis approval has been given for TEU to serve as a testing center for two tests administered by ETS, the Graduate Record Examinations (GRE) and the Graduate Management Admission Test (GMAT).

"I am looking forward to our association and cooperation with the Educational Testing Service. I believe that the establishment of our institution as an ETS testing center provides us an additional opportunity to better serve the needs of our students," Turns said in making the announcement.

The "trial approval" status is standard procedure in designating new testing centers. After a trial period of approximately two years, and after the need for the testing center is clearly demonstrated, permanent approval will be granted by ETS, according to Turns.

The following testing dates have been assigned:

The Graduate Record Examinations will be administered twice yearly, in January and in April, beginning in 1976.

The Graduate Management Admission Test will be administered in July, beginning in 1977.



TEU PARTICIPATES IN FLAG FOOTBALL

The Texas Eastern University flag football team extended their record to 4-1 Sunday by gaining a victory over the USI Square Shooters by forfeit. TEU is participating in a nine-team flag football league sponsored by the YMCA.

The university team has beaten the Terminex Raiders 22-6, the TP&L Chargers 21-7 and the GE Rangers 21-12 and lost a 13-7 battle to the Van Cowboys.

David Davenport is coaching the TEU team, which is composed of one faculty member and 12 students. Other students include Dale Burgess, Richard Boone, Cecil Fambrough, Bart Fields, Lynn Johnston, Joseph Miller, Mickey Serice, Steve Sykes, Bob Turner, Eric Pottkotter and Glynn Roberts.

Fred Mears is the faculty member of the team.

Texas Eastern will play the Edom Wranglers at 3:30 p.m. on Nov. 16, the Terminex Raiders at 2:15 p.m. on Nov. 23, the Chandler Broncs at 3:30 p.m. on Dec. 7, and Todd's Hot Shots at 3:30 p.m. on Dec. 14.

All games are played at Caldwell Field, located one block west of Caldwell Auditorium.

TELEPHONE TIPS FROM BUSINESS OFFICE


TEX-AN

All long distance telephone calls by university personnel to persons or points within the state should be through the TEX-AN system because of much lower costs.

TEX-AN can be utilized when you are on travel status (intra-state). A list of operator numbers and instructions for TEX-AN calls for "off-to-on" network calls for travelers' use can be obtained from Ellen Hogan. The cards are particularly useful for office callbacks when you are out of town.

COLLECT CALLS

Collect calls should NOT be accepted by university personnel without first making sure that the operator has been given the departmental credit card number for billing purposes. Usually it is less expensive to place several TEX-AN calls to reach a party than it is to have them return the call on a collect basis, especially if you plan to talk for less than 3 minutes.



YOUTH SEMINARS CONTINUING AT TEU

The departments of finance, health and physical education and chemistry will present the next three Talented Youth Seminars at Texas Eastern University.

Dennis Breeden will discuss "The Stock Market" at the Nov. 18 meeting. Sixteen high school seniors from East Texas have registered for the seminar.

(RAFFIC SAFETY PROGRAM BEGINS MONDAY; DICK JARRELL TO SERVE AS COORDINATOR

The Multi-Jurisdictional Traffic Safety Program of Texas Eastern University will officially be launched Monday with Dick Jarrell serving as coordinator.

Texas Eastern University was invited by Gov. Dolph Briscoe to assume one of the area leadership roles in the Governor's Office of Traffic Safety Program and the TEU Board of Regents voted their approval of the participation on Sept. 17.

Funding of the program will be through the governor's office. The coordinator's office will be located off campus until facilities become available within the university.

"It is with pleasure that I announce the implementation of a new program at Texas Eastern University for which our institution has been invited to serve as area headquarters by Governor Dolph Briscoe through the Governor's Office of Traffic Safety," President Stewart said.

"At the same time, I am happy, indeed, to name such a capable person as Dick Jarrell as coordinator," he added.

Jarrell is a native of Dallas and a graduate of Austin College in Sherman. He has worked as planner and senior planner for the city of Lubbock, city planner for Wichita Falls, director of planning and zoning for Abilene, director of community development for Greenville and since January, 1973, has served as traffic systems coordinator for the city of Tyler.

Jarrell will be working with any governmental unit--schools, cities, counties, etc.--providing research and development assistance as well as educational programs to help reduce traffic accidents and the resulting damages, injuries and deaths.

President Stewart said, "Dick Jarrell is one of the most knowledgeable and most respected individuals in Texas in the area of traffic safety. His professional service with the city of Tyler speaks for itself in this respect. We are delighted to have him head this program at Texas Eastern and to provide the outstanding leadership of which he is capable."

TEU will be serving a 12-county area in East Texas, including Gregg, Kaufman, Ellis, Henderson, Harrison, Marion, Upshur, Van Zandt, Wood, Smith, Navarro and Cass.

Fourteen counties are served by East Texas State University in Commerce and one county is served by El Centro College in Mesquite. All three areas are in the East Texas District of the Governor's Office of Traffic Safety.

"WHO'S WHO" RECIPIENTS TO BE HONORED

The President's Hour for November will include a special salute to the 32 Texas Eastern University students who were recently named "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges."

The monthly meeting, open to all faculty and professional employees, will be at 4 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 20, in the University Auditorium.

TEU students who have been named Who's Who will be recognized and awarded their certificates. Refreshments will be served in the Conference Room following the presentation of certificates.

The Texas Eastern University Board of Regents will meet at 3 p.m. on Dec. 3 in the Conference Room on the North Campus. Committee meetings will begin at 2 p.m.

Several items on the agenda will involve preparation and planning for the new campus. These include a telephone contract, a food service agreement and consideration of a legal counsel for the revenue bond program which will be used to build the Health and Physical Education Building and related facilities.

Reports will be given by several committees including the executive committee, legal committee, personnel committee and the campus and building committee. In addition, Dr. James H. Stewart, Jr. will present the president's report and recommendations.

JUNIOR COLLEGE OFFICIALS TO VISIT

Academic vice presidents and deans of the junior colleges of East Texas have been invited to attend a meeting at Texas Eastern University on Dec. 4.

The purpose of the meeting, according to Donald M. Anthony, is to strengthen communications between Texas Eastern University and area community and junior colleges.

Matters of mutual concern will be discussed, including transfer of students to TEU.

The meeting, which will include a tour of the new campus, will be from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. A luncheon will conclude the session.

The University Concert Chorale presented its first public performance Thursday morning in the chapel of the First Presbyterian Church to the TEU's Women's Association.

The choir, under the direction of Chadwick Edwards, is composed of undergraduate and graduate students. Prior to the choir's program, three parttime applied faculty members presented solo performances.

Mrs. Charlotte Marrow and Richard Herr played selections on the harp and organ, respectively and Mrs. Daisy Highfill sang two songs accompanied by Mr. Herr on the piano.
