COORDINATING BOARD STAFF TO VISIT CAMPUS OF TEXAS EASTERN UNIVERSITY

The staff of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, will visit Texas Eastern University on Monday, Nov. 17, for the purpose of reviewing the role and scope of the University.

The principal purpose of the visit will be to discuss institutional projections for the next five years and proposed changes for the institution's role and scope.

This visit is being made in accordance with the charge given to the Coordinating Board by the 64th Texas Legislature which requires the Coordinating Board to study the role and scope of each state institution of higher learning in Texas.

Data has been compiled and reports have been forwarded to the Coordinating Board as a first step in the role and scope review.

GOV. BRISCOE APPOINTS TYLERITE TO SIX-YEAR TERM ON COORDINATING BOARD

Ralph Spence, a Tyler resident and a director of the Texas Eastern University Foundation, was one of three men appointed to a six-year term on the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System this week by Gov. Dolph Briscoe.

Spence replaces another Tylerite, Watson W. Wise, on the 18-member board. Wise's term expired on Sept. 1

"We appreciate the years of service Mr. Wise has given to the Coordinating Board and higher education in Texas and his assistance as a member of that board to Texas Eastern University during our formative years," President Stewart said.

"Ralph Spence is keenly interested in and very knowledgeable about higher education and I know he will be an asset to the Coordinating Board and will contribute immeasurably to the college and university programs of our state," Dr. Stewart added.

Other appointments to the Coordinating Board announced Tuesday by Gov. Briscoe include John Fainter, Jr. of Sugarland and L. F. Peterson of Fort Worth. They were named to replace Robert Baker of Houston and Dr. James Hollers of San Antonio, respectively.

EMPLOYEES ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE IN STATE INCOME DEFERRAL PROGRAM

State employees are allowed to participate in an income deferral program through provisions of Senate Bill 872 of the 63rd Texas Legislature.

The employee has the option of several different ways in which to participate in this plan, according to Wayne Williams, director of personnel services for Texas Eastern.

Open enrollment for employees is during the month of November of each year, with deductions to begin in January. Any employee interested in this plan should contact a representative with one of the approved companies.

The Comptroller of Public Accounts, as administrator of the program, has set standards for companies wishing to participate, and has signed Master Agreements with qualified companies. Approved insurance companies are as follows:

PHASE I BUILDING PROGRAM PROGRESSING

Work on Phase I of the TEU building program is progressing and planning is now underway for the Phase II portion of the campus.
