Each junior college will perform for a critique during a session from 9:30-11:30 a.m. They will have rehearsal Saturday afternoon and present a joint concert at 7 p.m. in the University Center. The TEU Concert Choral will open the concert. Each visiting choral group will perform two selections and all will combine talents for the program finale.

335 STUDENTS APPLY FOR GRADUATION

Texas Eastern University has a total of 335 students eligible to participate in the fourth annual commencement according to applications on file in the office of admissions and records.

A total of 251 are candidates for bachelor's degrees with 84 candidates for master's degrees.

Nine degrees were awarded at the first commencement in 1974 with 140 in 1975 and 222 graduates last year.

Eighty-four students completed degree requirements in the summer, 93 in the fall semester and 158 are candidates for degrees this semester.

Degree production by school, with bachelor's degrees listed first and master's degrees second, includes: Applied Studies 52 and 1, Business Administration 54 and 3, Education and Psychology 71 and 70, Fine and Performing Arts 6 and 7, Humanities and Social Sciences 65 and 3, and Sciences and Mathematics 3 and 0.

Commencement is scheduled for 2 p.m. May 14 in Harvey Hall. Mrs. Betty Jo Hay of Dallas and a member of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, will be the commencement speaker.
