### Coursey, Clark Plan Song Recital Sunday

Herbert Coursey, artist-instructor at Texas Eastern University, and Clifford Clark, a New York based pianist-organist-conductor, will present a song recital at 3 p.m. Sunday in UC 134.

The program will be repeated in Carnegie Recital Hall in New York City at 8:30 p.m. on Sept. 10.

Winterreise, a cycle of 24 songs set by Franz Schubert in 1727 to poems of Wilhelm Mueller, will be presented at the concert which will mark the 150th year since Schubert's death.

Coursey is a graduate of North Texas State University and Indiana University. He was coached in the Winterreise cycle by Wolfgang Vacano and in Germany by Emy von Stetten at the conservatory Frankfurt Hoshschule fuer Musik.

Clark served as resident music director of St. Luke's Chapel of Trinity Parish, New York City from 1949 until recently. He has served as pupil and faculty member of important music centers such as the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto and the Manhattan School of Music in New York.

The record enrollment for a first summer term represents an 11.5 percent over the 875 figure of 1977.

## CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS RECEIVE BOARD APPROVAL

Projects relating to construction and the appearance of the Texas Eastern University campus received approval of the board of regents at a called meeting on May 24. These projects include the library, work on the upper dam and lake and paving of a new street.

The regents voted to seek bids to have a street paved from near the power plant to the intersection with Loop Drive. This will include paving across the lower dam. Included in the bid package will be curb, gutter and paving work.

Work around the upper lake is to include clearing and sodding and adding top soil to the dam to make a 4-1 grade from the new walkway to the water level.

With the exception of a skylight being removed from the library drawings and the rejecting of elevation plans for the parking and sidewalks in the library project, the regents approved the preliminary design documents and gave the architects the green light to proceed to the 50 percent completion phase of the design work. Elevation plans are to be resubmitted. The skylight is to be eliminated from the building plans.

### Eight New Directors Named

Eight new directors has been named to the board of directors of the Texas Eastern University Educational Foundation, Inc. New members appointed to the board by the TEU Board of Regents include Simon Henderson II of Lufkin, Edwin Brown of Troup and six Tylerites—Carl E. Bochow, Bruce G. Brookshire, Mrs. D. K. Caldwell, Miss Nancy E. Lake, Harry S. Phillips and John A. Warner.

Directors of the foundation, at an April meeting, voted to increase the number of directors from 30 to 40.

Officers of the foundation include A. W. Riter, Jr. as president, Isadore Roosth as vice president and C. Quentin Abernathy as secretary-treasurer.

### Medical Technology Program Accredited For Two Years

The Texas Eastern University medical technology program has been granted accreditation for a period of two years by the Committee on Allied Health Education and Accreditation, a department of the Allied Health Evaluation, American Medical Association.

Accreditation action was taken by the committee on recommendation from the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences, the Review Committee sponsored by the American Society of Clinical Pathologists, and the American Society for Medical Technology.

Enrollment in the clinical phase of the program is limited to 10 students per year. A class of nine will begin the 50-week study in July. Twenty students have been admitted from 1975 through the 1977 class.

### FOUR RECEIVE SCHOLARSHIPS

Four Texas Eastern University students have been named recipients of Health Care Scholarships for 1978-79. These scholarships are presented by the Women's Auxiliary to the Smith County Medical Society.

Recipeints of \$175 scholarships are Artie Campbell, Martha Coker, Patricia Keeling and Gwendolyn K. Williams.

The Women's Auxiliary awards approximately 15 scholarships to deserving health career majors attending the Texas Eastern School of Nursing, Tyler Junior College or Texas Eastern University. The scholarship covers tuition and fees for part-time or full-time enrollment. Funds for the scholarship are derived from the annual Book Fair.

### 40 TEU STUDENTS MAKE PRESIDENT'S HONOR ROLL

### **TEU Purchases New Lawn Tractor**

The Physical Plant Department has obtained a Toro Groundsmaster 52 lawn tractor capable of cutting up to 18 acres in an eight-hour day or 2.25 acres per hour in level unobstructed terrain. It is estimated that the tractor can cut as much area as 4.2 men with 20 inch push mowers in areas where the terrain permits the lawn tractor to be used.

The tractor is powered by a 16 horsepower, rear mounted engine with the mowing deck located in front of the tractor. It has a very short turning radius (which increases efficiency around trees), single foot pedal control of ground speed and excellent operator visibility.

"The Physical Plant Department is confident that this acquisition will enhance mowing efficiency on the TEU campus," L. J. Grubbs said of the new machinery.
