# Library Bid Opening Scheduled Tuesday

The Texas Eastern University Board of Regents will meet at 1 p.m. Tuesday with three items scheduled for consideration. A highlight of the afternoon will be the bid opening for the library building at 3 p.m. in ADM 127.

Other items to be presented by the Campus and Building Committee include a contract change and campus master plan revision.

Two areas to be decided under the master plan revision include landscape and land use. The landscape portion is for consideration of the goal statement pertaining to landscaping which provides for preserving the natural beauty of the site by retaining natural woodland areas where there is no conflict with facility use. Land use is a clarification on the distinction between the biology study plot and the woodland area.

The North Texas State University Lab Band will be featured in a jazz concert on Saturday, Nov. 4 on the Texas Eastern University campus.

Sponsored by the TEU Special Events Committee, the concert will be presented in the University Center beginning at 7:30 p.m. The public is invited to attend. Admission is free.

# Faculty Workload Policy Given Approval By Board

A revised faculty workload policy for Texas Eastern University was approved by the board of regents at an Oct. 18 meeting. Although the basic faculty workload of 12 hours for fall and spring and six hours for summer terms has not changed, some additions to the policy have been included in order to meet more fully the requirements suggested by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

The Academic and Personnel Committee of the board did not present the procedures for resolving a grievance at the Oct. 18 meeting. Additional study is to be given the proposal by the committee prior to presenting a policy for board consideration.

In other action, the regents voted to retain present traffic circulation on campus and the entrance/exit at Old Omen Road and selected a place to locate a coliseum, a proposed building in Phase IV.

Approval was also given to purchase new equipment including a new platemaker, a press, colorhead for a press and stapler for the print shop.

### Three Research Projects Approved

Three faculty research projects have received funding following the recommendation of the Faculty Research Committee and the vice president for academic affairs.

Mac R. Moseley is to receive \$695 for a research project entitled "Attitude Differences Toward Disabled Persons as a Function of Educational Integration."

"Evaluation of Community Development Programs" is a research project of Terry L. Busson which has funding of \$1,200.

Wayne H. Goff's project of "A Simulation Model for Teaching Management Science Techniques" is funded for \$622.
