A Readers Theatre Workshop will be conducted by Judy Freeman Friday with activities scheduled from 9:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. A workshop will be in BUS 212 from 9:30 a.m. - 12:15 p.m., in ADM 127 from 1:30 - 6 p.m. and in ADM 121, 122, 134, PHE 110 and 124 from 2:15 to 3:30 p.m.

Coffee for visiting art students and Goff will begin at 9:30 a.m. Friday in the second floor hall of the HPR Building. Goff will discuss his works at a session in UC 134, beginning at 10 a.m. Following lunch, he will critique the art exhibits on the second floor of the HPR Building.

In the School of Business Administration, Milton Jones will chair the Department of Accounting and Wendell C. Hewett will chair the Department of Management and Marketing.

The five chairmen in the School of Education and Psychology include: Vivian A. Hicks, Curriculum and Instruction; Keith W. McCoy, Health and Physical Education; W. Clayton Allen, Industrial Education; Gary Mears, Psychology; and Mac R. Moseley, Special Services.

In the Library, Mrs. Olene Harned will continue as university librarian and Kenneth R. Casstevens will continue as coordinator of the media center.

Tom G. Turns is to serve as dean of Student Services. Within this area will be Martha Wheat as director of admissions, Robert Marsh as registrar, Christina W. Mitchell as director of counseling and testing and James E. Shaw as director of student financial aid.

Patricia A. Gajda will serve as associate vice president for graduate studies and curriculum.

Robert L. Cox, George Joyce, Frank H. Smyrl and L. Lynn Sherrod will continue to serve as deans in their respective schools.

All new appointments and titles are effective Sept. 1, 1980.

The new organization for UT Tyler is subject to approval by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

Fiscal Affairs Changes Revealed

Three appointments have been made by John R. Sawyer for fiscal affairs at The University of Texas at Tyler. The appointments are effective Sept. 1, 1980. The new reorganization structure is subject to final approval by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

A. Wayne Criswell will become assistant to the vice president for fiscal affairs. This is a staff position.

E. Keith Kennedy has been appointed comptroller. Areas of responsibility under Kennedy include payroll, investments, cashier and accounting and reporting. Reporting to Kennedy will be Peyton Jones, who has been named director of purchasing and general services. Jones will be responsible for the bookstore, inventory, mail and telephone, print shop, receiving, stores and vouchering.

In the only other change, Steve A. Wilson has been named director of the Data Processing Center. He has previously served as acting director.

Unchanged within the fiscal affairs organization are the positions of Sally Romano as director of personnel services, L. J. Grubbs as director of the physical plant and resident engineer, and Larry Roberts as chief of university police.

The position of internal auditor is not to be filled.

Board Clears Reorganization

A proposed reorganization for The University of Texas at Tyler received approval of the UT System Board of Regents at their meeting April 11 in Arlington. Also approved for UT Tyler were recommended amendments to the 1979-80 operating budget.

Budget amendments included the appointment of Jerry L. Landrum and William D. Saban to the faculty for the spring semester and the removal of three faculty members who have left the university—Robert G. Teeter, George Weisheit and John M. Callahan.

First Savings Bond Campaign Ends

The first UT Tyler Savings Bond Campaign officially ended March 21 with 190 employees having received enrollment information.

Eleven employees enrolled in the payroll savings plan or 5.8 percent of those contacted. Nine applied for the \$50 bond; one for the \$75 bond and one for the \$100 bond.

Information received from the U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Dallas indicated that enrollment in the program has dropped significantly in their region due to the current economic situation.
