Dr. Sowell is to study "Diagnosing Mathematics Abilities of Elementary School Students" during the 1980-81 academic year. Her proposal received funding of \$865.

Dr. Ford has received funding of \$2,078 for his research in "Snakes as Indicator Species for Toxicity Determinations."

"Emerging Figures (Series II)" is funded for \$954 and will be the area of research for Dr. Stephens.

Dr. Stewart received \$2,000 for a study of "Some Nutritional and Biochemical Studies of a Green Alga, Characiosiphon rivularis."

The research project by Dr. Glascock entitled "Mudejarismo in Mexico" has funding of \$1,060.

Dr. Killebrew received the largest grant, \$4,747.07 to conduct research in "Genetic Variability in Smith County Populations of Malacosoma americana Fabricius (Lasiocampidae: Lepidoptera).

Juniors Set Enrollment Pace

Juniors dominate the enrollment and the average age of all students is just below 30. These figures are among many provided by the registrar's office in a profile of students enrolled at The University of Texas at Tyler for the fall semester.

Juniors account for 55.04 percent of the enrollment with 1,059. The university has 274 seniors enrolled this semester, representing 14.24 of the student body. At the graduate level, the 30.71 percent includes 274 students who are enrolled in post baccalaureate classes and 317 who are in a master's degree program.

Of the 1,924 students, females outnumber males 1,155 to 769.

The average age of the student this semester is 29.7, breaking under 30 years of age for the first time since 1976. The students range in age from 18 to 75 with 33 percent of the the students from 20 to 23. Students between 20 and 29 years of age make up 59.8 percent of the headcount for the fall term.

Students are enrolled from 50 counties in Texas, 19 other states and 15 foreign countries, all up from the fall semester of 1979. Out-of-state students represent two percent of the enrollment while foreign country enrollment is less than one percent.
