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"A greater challenge"

"You mean people get paid to do this? This is fun," were Dr. Tommy Gilbreath's first comments about teaching when he was in the student teaching program at Sul Ross University working toward a bachelor's degree in industrial arts.

Gilbreath, associate professor of technology, reminiscing about earlier days in the classroom, said, "Teaching kids is exciting and really turns me on. The enthusiasm of kids is a pleasure to see.

"I taught in public schools for six years and thoroughly enjoyed it," he said. "However, I find a great deal of enthusiasm with university students, and their maturity is much more satisfying."

Being a professor is a greater challenge than being a high school teacher, the 1981 Amoco Foundation Award winner said.

"To be professor is to be imminently qualified in a field" he explained, "and I suppose it is a goal which may never be reached. All of us who consider ourselves scholars find it hard to remain current in our field. To be current and exemplary in your field is hard to do."

Gilbreath sees great teachers as people who genuinely care about people.

"Expertise must be involved in the consideration of what makes a professor a great teacher, but caring for people is absolutely a fundamental concern," he said.

The technology department at UT Tyler serves several different clinetel, including both education and industry. Gilbreath is currently working more in the industrial capacity.

"At the present time, I work more with industrial people," he said, "however, I still keep my hand in education. Presently I am Coordinator of Judges for the Texas Industrial Arts Association Statewide Competition held in Waco each year. My job is to arrange for the judging."

Gilbreath, a member of the UT Tyler faculty since 1976, holds M.Ed. and D.Ed. degrees from Texas A&M University in industrial education.
