Tornado watch procedures set

Procedures to be followed should the Tyler area go under a tornado watch have been set for the UT Tyler campus.

Spotters (watch personnel) equipped with walkie-talkies and binoculars will be posted on the rooftops of University Center and the Sciences and Mathematics Building. Alert personnel equipped with walkie-talkies and/or pagers will be stationed inside the Library, Physical Plant, Physical and Health Education, Administration, Hudnall-Pirtle-Roosth and Business Buildings.

In the event that a tornado is spotted, the spotters will relay the word by radio to all alert personnel who in turn will direct occupants in their building to a designated area. To aid in alerting the entire campus population, patrol vehicles will sound highlow sirens while driving the inner campus drive.

If a tornado should strike the campus, the University Police and other qualified personnel will provide first aid as needed and secure state property.

Areas of safety have been selected in each building, with designations for safest and safe areas. These include:

Three offices are moved

Olga Fischer selected for 1983 Amoco Award

Dr. Olga Howard Fischer, assistant professor of education at UT Tyler, is the recipient of the 1983 Amoco Foundation's Teaching Award. Dr. George F. Hamm, president of the university, recently presented Dr. Fishcer with a \$1,000 gift from the Amoco Foundation.

Fischer has been a member of The University of Texas at Tyler faculty since 1980. Before coming to Tyler she taught at George Peabody College for Teachers in Nashville, Tennessee and Conastota Junior-Senior High School, in Conastota, N.Y.

Fischer received her Ph.D. from George Peabody College for Teachers; M.A.T. degree from Colgate University in Hamilton, N.Y.; and B.A. degree from LaSalle College in Philadelphia, Penn.

Fischer is a member of Phi Delta Kapa, Delta Kappa Gamma, Texas Association of Supervision and Curriculum Development, National Council of Teachers of English, Texas Joint Council of Teachers of English, Texas Association Gifted and Talented and Consortium for Research on Teaching and Learning.

At UT Tyler, Fischer has taught graduate level courses in curriculum development, clinical supervision, styles and strategies, and middle school and secondary school language arts methods. She has taught undergraduate courses in education as well as supervising student teachers.

The Amoco Foundation presents The University of Texas System funds each year to recognize an outstanding faculty member on each of the seven academic campuses in the system.

Previous recipients of the award include Dr. Tommy D. Gilbreath, associate professor of technology; Dr. W. Clayton Allen, chairman of the Department of Technology and professor of technology; Dr. C. Ray Gullett, professor of businesss administration and Dr. J. Paxton Hart, professor of English.
