A lecture series featuring a variety of speakers who have used positive values to achieve success in their lives is scheduled as a public service by The University of Texas at Tyler beginning at 3 p.m. Nov. 2, in Room 158 of the Business Administration Building.

Entitled "Lifestyles," this series in in addition to UT Tyler's Distinguished Lecture Series and is open to the general public at no charge.

Glen E. Lemon, president of the Texas Bankers Association and chairman of the board and chief executive officer of First Bank and Trust Company of Booker, will open the series with "An American Success Story -- Banking in a Rural Community."

Scheduled for Nov. 17 is Harvey Mackay of Mackay Envelope Company, Minneapolis, MN., speaking on "Ten Lessons I Didn't Learn in Business School."

On Jan. 26, 1984, James Surls, an artist from Splendora, will speak on "The Artist as Entrepreneur. How to Make Art and Make a Living." Tylerite Bruce Brookshire, chairman of the board of Brookshire Grocery Company, is scheduled Feb. 23 to present "The Role of Enthusiasm and Motivation in Building Organizational Spirit."

"What It Means to Be a Woman Chief Executive Officer Today" will be the topic of Lyda Hill of Dallas, granddaughter of the late H.L. Hunt, on March 1. Dr. Patrick Thomas, Tyler surgeon, will present "The Role of the Spiritual in Healing" on March 13.

Strategic plan shows needs of future

Highlights of The University of Texas at Tyler's strategic plan through 1991 were presented to the UT System Board of Regents at a meeting Oct. 14 in Galveston by UT Tyler president Dr. George F. Hamm.

During the general session the board approved Dr. Hamm's recommendations for appointments to the UT Tyler Development Board, an oil and gas lease on property acquired from the Louise Lindsey Merrick estate, several UT Tyler contracts, and amendments to the 1982-83 operating budget.

In his presentation, Dr. Hamm capsulized UT Tyler's mission and summarized the constituencies served by the upper-level and graduate university. He described the East Texas region as the third fastest growing in the state and cited the corresponding expansion of UT Tyler.

Reasons for the rapid growth of UT Tyler, according to Dr. Hamm, "are strong community support, an increased scholarship program, additional faculty positions, a marketing plan resulting in greater visibility, and a growing reputation which attracts students from throughout the state, nation and the world."

In order to realize future goals set for the university, Dr. Hamm stated that new graduate academic programs and additional physical facilities would be needed.

Hi-Plains Hydrocarbon, Inc., was awarded the oil an gas lease on an undivided one-half mineral interest on 640 acres in Moore County.

Continuing Education coordinator named

Barbee Frisby has been named to the new part time position of coordinator for continuing education, effective Sept. 15.

"My goal is to have a viable program that will be an attribute to the community and to the university," Frisby said.

Frisby received her B.A. degree from the University of California at Berkley with a double major in political science and English. A court reporter for 11 years, she was responsible for coordinating seminars and continuing education programs for the California Court Reporters Association and the Hawaii Court Reporters' Association and served as an officer in both.

She and her husband, Tom, own Frisby and Associates, a construction management law firm in Tyler. Her work there also involves arranging seminars given by Frisby in construction management, legal research and documentation, and marketing.

Frisby believes her role in the business community will be helpful in her work at UT Tyler. "I have the opportunity to keep up with the pulse of the community, to have a feel for what's going on in the business world," she said.

Her immediate aim is to develop procedures for a strong continuing education program that can begin offering seminars in the near future.

United Way contributions up

With returns of pledge cards incomplete at this time, 203 employees of UT Tyler have participated in the 1983 United Way Campaign, with contributions showing a 34 percent increase in donations over 1983.

Campus campaign chairman John R. Sawyer said, "Any employee who has not returned a pledge card is urged to return it to a group leader no later than Monday, Oct. 31."
