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Orchestra performs Oct. 3

The Fort Worth Chamber Orchestra will be in concert at 8 p.m. Monday, Oct. 3, in the opening of the 1983-84 Fine Arts Concert jointly sponsored by The University of Texas at Tyler and Tyler Junior College. The concert will be in Wise Auditorium on the TJC campus.

Formerly Texas Little Symphony, the touring classical ensemble recently made an impact on the international music scene with a tour of Hong Kong and the People's Republic of China. Two musical souvenirs of that tour, *Dance of the Yao People* and *Moonlight on Second Spring*, will be included in the performance.

John Giordano, the orchestra's music director, is consultant to the East Texas Symphony and will conduct its first concert of the season in November.

Free tickets for the concert are available for UT Tyler employees and their immediate family through noon on the day of the performance. Tickets may be picked up in the Public Information Office, ADM 215. UT Tyler students with a current ID card may be admitted at the door.

General admission tickets will be available in the University Bookstore at \$5 for adults and \$2 for students.

Fall enrollment sets record

Enrollment for the fall semester at UT Tyler is 3,148, a 20 percent increase over the fall semester one year ago. The 525 increase in enrollment is the fifth consecutive long semester for a record enrollment to be set by the university.

Sixty-two percent of the students are enrolled as juniors or seniors with the other 38 percent enrolled in graduate-level classes. The headcount includes 1,943 females and 1,205 males.

UT Tyler's students are residents of 65 counties, 28 states and 17 foreign countries. Smith County is considered the place of residence of 50.54 percent of the students with Gregg County second at 13.4 percent or 423 students. Henderson, Rusk and Cherokee counties follow in that order with 5.9, 4.5 and 3.7 percent of the enrollment, respectively.

The average age of the currently enrolled student is 30 while the median age is 28. The largest number of students at any one age is 301 at age 22.

The current growth pattern began in the fall of 1981 with 1,957 students enrolled. This was followed by 2,042 in the spring, 2,623 last fall and 2,753 last spring.

Sociology professor helps Sea Grant Project

Dr. Davor Jedlicka, assistant professor of sociology, is the leader of one of the 28 projects making up the Texas A&M Sea Grant Program for 1983-84.

Jedlicka, in collaboration with Robert Lee Maril, associate professor of behavioral sciences at Texas Southmost College in Brownsville, will assess the impact of Texas' coastal industrial development and population growth on the allocation of marine resources.

The \$1,700,000 federal grant from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, U.S. Department of Commerce, includes support for research at Texas A&M, UT Tyler, The University of Texas Marine Sciences Institute, the University of Houston and its campus at Clear Lake City, Baylor College of Medicine and Texas Southmost College. Matching funds from state, local, university and private sources will bring the total budget to \$3,360,000 in support of the 28 Sea Grant projects.

"A university must have outstanding research facilities and compete nationally in order to become a participant in the Sea Grant Program. It is an honor for UT Tyler, as a non-coastal university, to be a participant in this large and prestigious program," Jedlicka said.

"The three interdependent purposes of the study are to measure the multiple use of Texas coastal resources, to ascertain the impact of industrial development upon coastal communities, and to assess the relationship between commercial fishing trends in Texas and increases in industrial development," he explained.

The major role for UT Tyler in the program is to conduct a population analysis and determine trends in industrial growth based on historical data and the 1980 census.

Data will be analyzed employing the 1970 and 1980 census, an original survey of Texas coastal communities and in-depth interviews with leaders in the selected communities. These data are of interest both to the Texas Coastal and Marine Council and the Texas Energy and National Resources Advisory Council.
