Cisneros to speak at commencement

San Antonio Mayor Henry G. Cisneros will be the speaker for the 1985 Spring Commencement of The University of Texas at Tyler, Dr. George F. Hamm announced today. The commencement recognizing both fall and spring graduates of UT Tyler will be at 7:30 p.m. Friday, May 10, in Harvey Hall.

Cisneros was a faculty member at UT San Antonio, teaching urban and environmental affairs, before he entered the political arena. He holds a bachelor of arts degree and a master's degree from Texas A&M University and a second master's degree at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard. From there he went to George Washington University where he completed his doctorate.

The mayor served as a member of the San Antonio City Council from 1975 to 1981 when he became a candidate for mayor and won by a large majority. He was reelected to his third term in office this month.

The commencement speaker is the mayor of Texas' third largest and the country's 10th largest city, and the first Hispanic mayor of a major American city. He was one of several prospective vice presidential candidates interviewed in 1984 by Walter Mondale.

In 1982, Cisneros delivered the Richard S. Childs lecture to the City Club of New York, in which he laid out his views for the foundation of a national urban policy that recognizes the need to coordinate urban development with national reconstruction. The speech was widely covered and reproduced in "Representative American Speeches in 1982 and 1983."

Three professorships announced at meeting

Three members of The University of Texas at Tyler faculty were named to professorships at a meeting of the UT System Board of Regents held in Tyler April 11-12. All appointments are for the 1985-86 academic year.

Dr. Paula Lundberg, assistant professor of psychology, was named to the J.S. Hudnall Professorship for American Affairs and Dr. James F. Koukl, director of the medical technology program, was named to the J.S. Hudnall Professorship in Energy and Technology.

Hudnall Professorships have been awarded at UT Tyler for each of the past three years.

Dr. Wendell C. Hewett, professor of business administration, was named to the George W. and Robert S. Pirtle Distinguished Professorship in Free Enterprise. He is the first recipient of this professorship, funded through an endowment given to the university by George W. Pirtle and Robert S. Pirtle.

In other action, the board voted to accept a \$5,000 gift and a \$20,000 pledge, payable over a five-year period, for a total of \$25,000 from Nancy Lake to establish the H.J. McKenzie Presidential Endowed Scholarship at UT Tyler. Income earned from the endowment will be used to grant annual scholarships to outstanding students at the university.

Cox elected to national post

Dr. Robert L. Cox, dean of The University of Texas at Tyler School of Education and Psychology, was elected chair pro tempore to the Advisory Council of State Representatives (ACSR) of the national association of colleges for teacher education.

ACSR coordinates programs and activities of the state affiliates of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education (AACTE).
