Medieval art exhibition planned for Nov. 11-13

"Aspects of Medieval Art and Culture: Focus on Metz, France" is to be the theme of a mini-exhibition Nov. 11-13 in UC 101, presented by the Departments of Art and Humanities. The exhibit will be open from 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. each day.

Included will be photographs representing medieval art and architecture, reproduced manuscripts from the period, icons and a decorative motif from a building in Metz recreated in charcoal on paper by UT Tyler art students. A slide presentation accompanies the exhibit.

Oral presentations on distinctive characteristics of medieval art and culture are scheduled for 1 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 13 by Jane Brown, instructor of art, Dr. Andrew Szarka, associate professor of history, and Dr. Jean Claude Lejosne, visiting professor of linguistics and Germanic languages from the University of Metz.

Brown will consider the role of visual arts in the Middle Ages, Szarka will sketch the historical and societal framework and Lejosne will discuss medieval monuments in Metz.
