Early registration set April 22 - 25

Early registration for summer and fall semesters at UT Tyler is scheduled for April 22-25.

Hours are 8 a.m. - 6 p.m. Tuesday and Wednesday, and 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. Thursday and Friday. Students may early register for summer sessions I and II as well as the fall semester anytime during those hours.

"Faculty and staff should note that early registration has been moved forward one day because of the state Sesquicentennial holiday, Monday, April 21. All offices will be closed on that date with early registration scheduled Tuesday through Friday," said Dr. Thomas L. Fernandez, vice president for academic affairs.

Dates for regular registration are June 4 for summer I, July 14 for summer II and Sept. 2 for fall.

Dr. Vincent J. Falzone, professor of history and chairman, Department of Humanities, presented a paper on the origins of the civil rights movement Feb. 26 as part of Black History Week activities at Texas College.

Saving bonds campaign to begin

President George Hamm has designated April 15 - May 15 as the 1986 U.S. Savings Bonds Payroll Savings Campaign for UT Tyler. Mark Heckmann, director of the public information office, will serve as campaign chairman.

During a period of declining interest rates, the guaranteed rate on Series EE Saving Bonds becomes attractive. In addition to the market-based rates, U.S. saving bonds provide the holder a guarantee of a minimum rate of 7.5% regardless of the prevailing market conditions. The market-determined rate or the minimum guaranteed rate, whichever is higher, will be paid.

Brochures and other information about U.S. Saving Bonds will be made available to all employees during the campaign.
