Artist Bill Komodore of Dallas will talk about his paintings at 2 p.m., Tuesday, March 11 in ADM 127. Third in the Visiting Artist Series sponsored by the Department of Art, Komodore's lecture is open to the public at no charge.

Komodore, whose style has been described as "a kind of fantastic realism," earned a bachelor of arts and a master of fine arts from Tulane University. He has been a guest lecturer at Southern Methodist University. Stephen F. Austin State University and the Dallas Museum of Art.

His paintings are owned by private collectors in Texas as well as museums throughout the country including the Whitney Museum of American Art and the National Gallery of Art. He has had one-man shows in New York, Dallas and his native Greece.

A marionette production of Sophocles' "Antigone" presented by Dr. Peter Arnott, Department of Drama chairman at Tufts University, will highlight the School of Liberal Arts' Classical Day Monday, March 17 on the UT Tyler campus.

More than 140 students of Latin from T.K. Gorman, Robert E. Lee and John Tyler high schools are expected to attend. Scheduled activities include the marionette theater presentation of "Antigone" at 10 a.m. and a lecture, "Production of Ancient Greek Plays," by Arnott at 11:30 a.m., both in ADM 127. Lunch at 12:15 p.m. in UC 134 and a showing of the film "A Funny Thing Happened On the Way to the Forum" at 1 p.m. in ADM 127 are planned for the afternoon.

Arnott teaches theater history at Tufts where he also directs plays at the University Theater. He originated the marionette theater as a medium for serious drama, particularly works from the Greek and Roman repertory, bringing students in contact with a vital theatrical experience.
