Renaissance art scholar opens Second Friday lecture series

"Renaissance Art," a discussion by art scholar Dr. Linda Hults, will be presented at 10:45 a.m. Friday, Nov. 14 in ADM 127.

The program is first in the university's new Second Friday Art History Lecture Series co-sponsored by UT Tyler's Department of Art and Friends of the Arts.

Hults, associate professor of art history at the University of Tulsa, specializes in Renaissance and Baroque art with concentration on the art of Albrecht Durer and Hans Baldung Grien. A scholar in the art of printmaking, she has edited a catalog for an exhibition of Thomas Moran prints, and her book, "The Print in the Western World: An Introductory History," will be published soon.

Other presentations in the series will be "Impressionism" by Mary Vernon, former chairman of art history at Southern Methodist University, Dec. 12, and "Contemporary Issues" by Susan Freudenheim, writer and recognized authority on contemporary art, Jan. 9.

Complimentary tickets for faculty, staff and students are available in the Office of Development. Patron tickets for the series are \$12 and individual lecture tickets are \$5.

Regional Art Exhibit to open Nov. 13

Works by artists from 10 states will be included in a juried Regional Art Exhibit Nov. 13 - Dec. 5 in UC 101. The exhibit will be open 8 a.m.-5 p.m. weekdays.

Twenty-eight works on paper, including a charcoal drawing by Susan Wright and a monoprint by Mary Mitchell, both UT Tyler students, were selected from more than 300 entries. Juror was Tom Toperzer, director of the University of Okahoma Museum of Art.

First, second and third place prizes will be awarded in the exhibit which features artists from Alabama, Georgia, Arksansas, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, Florida, Louisiana, Oklahoma, and Texas.
