# U.T. System Board of Regents to meet at U.T. Tyler in June

The Board of Regents of The University of Texas System will meet on the U.T. Tyler campus beginning at 1:30 p.m., Thursday, June 11 in the University Center. If items remain on the agenda, the board's meeting will continue on Friday, June 12.

The Board includes chairman Jess Hay, Dallas; vice chairmen Robert B. Baldwin III and Shannon H. Ratliff, both of Austin; Sam Barshop, San Antonio; Louis A. Beecherl, Jr., Dallas; Jack Blanton, Houston; W. A. "Tex" Moncrief, Jr., Fort Worth; Bill Roden, Midland; and Mario Yzaguirre, Brownsville.

Barshop, Beecherl and Moncrief are the newest members of the Board, appointed by Governor Clements to terms that expire Feb. 1, 1993.

Also attending will be U.T. System officials, including Chancellor Dr. Hans Mark, Executive Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs Dr. James P. Duncan, Executive Vice Chancellor for Health Affairs Dr. Charles B. Mullins, and Executive Vice Chancellor for Asset Management Michael E. Patrick. Others scheduled to attend include the presidents of the component institutions of the U.T. System.

## Johanson to open Summer Scholars guest lecturer series

Donald Carl Johanson, professor of anthropology at Stanford University, will be the first of four guest lecturers in the 1987 Windsor-Richardson Summer Scholars Program at UT Tyler Friday, June 12.

Other guest lecturers in the Summer Scholars Program will be: Ray Perryman, author of the "Texas Economic Forecast: The Perryman Report," June 15; Albert Shanker, president of the American Federation of Teachers, AFL-CIO, July 1; and Rafael Nieto Navia, vice president of the InterAmerican Court on Human Rights, July 28. All guest lectures will be held at 7:30 p.m. in the University Center and are open to the public.

Johanson received international recognition for his discovery of "Lucy," a 3 million-year-old woman -- the most complete skeletal remains of humankind found -- in Ethiopia in 1976. He holds doctorate and master's degrees from the University of Chicago, as well as honorary degrees from John Carroll University and The College of Wooster.

Made possible with a major gift from Mrs. W. C. Windsor of Tyler, the Windsor-Richardson Summer Scholars Program was established in the summer of 1986. The program is named in honor of Mrs. Windsor and her late husband, Wilbur Cunningham Windsor, and their daughter and son-in-law, the late Gertrude Anne and Will Mann Richardson.

#### Patriots named NAIA Academic All-Americans

Three members of the UT Tyler Patriots tennis team have been named Academic All-Americans for 1987 by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). Sandra Sigulinski, Per Ola Andersson and Daniel Henry Hovey are among 24 players chosen for the honor nationwide.

To be selected as an Academic All-American, a student must be attending a college or university fulltime, have a minimum grade point average of 3.25 and a demonstrated proficiency in intercollegiate tennis. Qualities such as citizenship and character, as well as involvement in extracurricular activities, are also considered.

Sigulinski, who was an All-American NAIA district champion at UT Tyler in 1986, placed first in NAIA doubles competition this year. She is a member of Phi Theta Kappa and the UT Tyler Student Foundation, and is majoring in business administration. Andersson won NAIA district champion in 1987 and 1986. An honors graduate this spring with a B.B.A. in accounting, he is recipient of the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants Accounting Excellence Award and the M.J. Harvey Award. Hovey, an NAIA district champion for 1986 and 1987, has been named to the National Dean's List and the UT Tyler President's Honor Roll. A management major who received a B.B.A. this spring, he is a member of Alpha Chi national honor society and the Student Foundation.
