Strauss to speak Thursday

Robert S. Strauss, former presidential advisor and past chairman of the Democratic National Committee, will be featured speaker in the UT Tyler Distinguished Lecture Series Thursday, Nov. 12.

Strauss, who recently served as co-moderator of the Republican presidential candidates debate, is scheduled to speak at 8 p.m. in the University Center.

Chairman of the Democratic National Committee from 1973 to 1976, Strauss entered the Cabinet of President Jimmy Carter in 1977. Over the next two-and-a-half years he successfully concluded the Tokyo round of multi-lateral trade negotiations and directed its passage through Congress which culminated in the Trade Act of 1979. Following completion of the trade agreements he served as President Carter's personal representative for Middle East peace negotiations.

An attorney, Strauss received his law degree from UT Austin. He served as a special agent of the FBI from 1941 to 1945.

Art history series opens Friday

Medieval art expert Dr. Jaroslav Folda will open the 1987-88 Second Friday Art History Lecture Series Friday, Nov. 13 in a lecture beginning at 10:45 a.m. in ADM 127. The series is cosponsored by Friends of the Arts and the Department of Art.

Folda's lecture, "The 'Byzantine Madonnas' in the National Gallery: Icons or Altarpieces?", will concentrate on two fine medieval paintings in the National Gallery, the Kahn and Mellon Madonnas, which often have been compared to Byzantine icons. Folda will discuss this connection and consider where the panels may have been made and whether they were painted by the same artist.

Folda, who holds a Ph.D. from Johns Hopkins University, is professor of art history at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Recipient of numerous honors and awards, including a Fulbright and several National Endowment for the Humanities grants, Folda has been a fellow at Dumbarton Oaks Center for Byzantine Studies and at the Center for Advanced Study in the Visual Arts, National Gallery of Art, Washington, D.C. He is the author of numerous articles and books on Crusader paintings and sculpture and has edited volumes on the history and art of the Crusades.

Cohen to discuss research at PDK meeting

Dr. Allen Cohen, chairman of the Department of Biochemistry and executive associate director of The University of Texas Health Center at Tyler, will be guest speaker at the Rose City Chapter of Phi Delta Kappa (PDK) meeting Thursday, Nov. 12.
