in the spotlight . . .

Dr. Barbara Hart, assistant professor of criminal justice, was luncheon speaker at a recent meeting of Smith County Republican Women. Her topic was "The Problem of Crime: Professional View and Public Perception."

Dr. Wendell C. Hewett, professor of business administration, presented a paper, "The Effect of 'Decontrol' on Jobbers within the Petroleum Industry," at the 1988 national meeting of the Decision Science Institute. The paper was published in the proceedings of the meeting which was held Nov. 21-23.

Dr. James F. Koukl, director of medical technology, spoke to middle school and high school guidance counselors in a program on health care careers sponsored by the Tyler Chamber of Commerce Health Services Committee Nov. 15.

Dr. Robert F. McClure, associate professor of psychology, presented "Demographic Variables Related to Senile Dementia of the Alzheimer's Type" at the annual meeting of the Texas Psychological Association Nov. 11 in Austin.

Dolly Smith, instructor of general business, is the author of "Move Over, Menander, Bellow Has Gone from the New Comedy to the Sublime," published as the lead article in the Winter 1988 edition of the Saul Bellow Journal, a refereed academic publication.

Dr. Jeanle Stanley, associate professor of political science, recently attended a meeting of grant recipients from The Center for the American Woman and Politics. She will collaborate with Diane Blair of the University of Arkansas to study "Gender Differences in the Perception, Development, Uses and Impact of Power in State Legislatures," one of 12 projects funded by a three-year grant from the Charles F. Revson Foundation.

Dr. Robert Taylor, associate professor of criminal justice, and the Policy Studies Group at UT Tyler received a \$10,000 contract-grant from the Gregg County District Attorney's Office in Longview for implementation and administration of an automated records system. The system, developed on a large local area network, was part of an \$80,000 federal grant given to only a few DA offices in the nation.

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Grants awarded to research program

Assessing the mental health of adult survivors of childhood incest is the focus of research grants totaling more than \$25,000 awarded to the Family Violence Research and Treatment Program (FVRTP) at UT Tyler.

A grant of \$22,785 from the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health and a UT Tyler faculty research grant of \$2,800 will support "Psychological Sequelae and Mental Health Issues for Adult Women Who Were Victims of Childhood Incest," a study conducted by associate professors of psychology Dr. Paula Lundberg-Love, FVRTP associate director, and Dr. Robert Geffner, FVRTP director.

As part of FVRTP's research efforts in assessing the mental health and behavioral characteristics of adult incest survivors, the study is designed to investigate characteristics of adult incest survivors in order to indicate whether women who were victims of incest as children are at risk for personality and behavioral problems, and whether therapy improves the woman's ability to overcome such trauma.

"This study is unique in that it will assess the differences in the mental health of both victims and non-victims of incest. Women who were victims of incest as children will be compared systematically to various control groups -- including non-victims who are entering therapy for other reasons, non-victims who are entering a health and exercise program, and non-victims who are not participating in any treatment program," explained Lundberg-Love.

The incest victims group will consist of 25 women ages 20 - 45 were sexually abused by a relative during their childhood but were not treated for the trauma at that time.

Current estimates of the prevalence of incest suggest that 20 percent of females in the United States may be victims of such sexual abuse by the age of 18. Research suggests that proper diagnosis and treatment of incest victims helps reduce psychological symptoms and avoid over-utilization of health delivery services.
