Drew's 25 years of experience in the performing arts includes major roles in more than 30 diverse productions, including "The Music Man," "Man of La Mancha," "Cabaret," "West Side Story," "Oliver!," "The Wizard of Oz" and "Guys and Dolls." In 1986 he made his debut as conductor and musical director of a production of "A Chorus Line."

Comedian Henry Cho, "the Korean hillbilly," will emcee a Talent Show 7 - 9 p.m. Friday, Nov. 18 in the University Center.

Cho, a 26-year-old Tennessee native, is one of the fastest rising stand-up comedians in the business. Known for his thick Tennessee accent, his act contains bits and pieces of his own life including growing up in Tennessee with Korean parents and college days at the University of Knoxville.

He has appeared on network and cable television and was a star attraction at the 1988 National Association of Collegiate Activities (NACA) annual conference.

Two case studies by seven students in the School of Business Administration have been named Distinguished Case Studies by the Small Business Administration. The awards will be presented by Dallas District SBA representatives at 10 a.m. Thursday, Nov. 17 in BUS 131.

Students Mark Cheatham, William Goza, Ladina Wingert, James Womack, Elizabeth Cunningham, Ronald Shamsie and John Toble conducted the award-winning studies which each included marketing research, telephone surveys, statistical computations and a 30-page written report.

Both studies, a financial analysis for a business venture in Tyler and a business plan for a new service in Longview, were conducted through the university's Small Business Institute.

Karen S. Lee, assistant professor of accounting, presented a tax update at the Community College in Accounting Education 14th annual workshop in Dallas sponsored by the American Accounting Association and the College of Business Administration, Texas Tech University. Participants included accounting faculty from colleges and throughout Texas as well as 11 other states.

Dr. Milton Jones, professor and Department of Accounting chairman, attended the Accounting Chairperson's Forum and Seminar for Accounting Education Oct. 20-21 in San Antonio. The major thrust of the meetings was the proposed legislation to require 150 hours for those who plan to become CPAs, which will have a major impact on university accounting curricula across the state.
