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Regents approve center funding

Initial funding for an \$18 million performance and activity center to be constructed at UT Tyler has been authorized by the UT System Board of Regents.

The project is to be funded by a \$12 million allocation from the UT System and \$6 million to be raised through private gift monies and student activity fees, said President George F. Hamm. The regents authorized initial funding of \$200,000, allocated from monies reserved for construction of the facility, to allow UT Tyler to retain an architect to develop preliminary design plans. It is anticipated that an architect will be appointed at the December board meeting.

Plans will address needs for specialized academic space for the arts, theatre, and music, including practice rooms, an art teaching gallery, and a recital hall/theatre, as well as a multiple purpose auditorium and student activity space.

The consulting architect will be retained to produce drawings, models and budgets for the project. This work will be used by the university to complete its drive for private matching funds. The purpose of the new center is to provide for critical needs of faculty and students for academic space and facilities for special events.
