Koch to speak in lecture series

Ed Koch, political commentator and former New York City mayor, will be presented Thursday, Feb. 27 in the Distinguished Lecture Series. The program begins at 8 p.m. in the University Center. Complimentary tickets are available to faculty in each dean's office; staff may pick up tickets in the Public Information Office.

Koch, one of the nation's most colorful and candid public figures, rose to national and international prominence as the 105th mayor of New York City. Elected mayor in 1978, he served three terms (12 years), turning budget deficits into surpluses and bringing the city its lowest unemployment rate in 20 years.

Since leaving office, he has become a partner in a major New York law firm and a visiting fellow at New York University's Urban Research Center. He writes a column of political commentary for "The New York Post" and is a CBS television commentator.

Koch's political career also includes service as a district leader, city councilman, and a congressman from New York in the U.S. House of Representatives. During his nine years in Congress he served on the House Appropriations Foreign Affairs Subcommittee.

Koch is author of the national best-seller *Mayor*, a funny and insightful view of New York and City Hall, and *Politics*, an anecdotal account of how the political system works.

- **Peru** — Field Biology (BIOL 4661). Dr. L. Lynn Sherrod, School of Sciences and Mathematics dean and professor of biology, and William Lamar, adjunct faculty member in biology. Enroll by March 15. Travel dates: June 6 - 13.
- **England, Scotland and Wales** — Comparative International Early Childhood Education (EDEC 5630) and Comparative International Education (EDUC 5630). Dr. Vivian Hicks, professor of education, and Julianne Hubble, senior lecturer in education. Enroll by April 15. Travel dates: June 1 - 20.
