Tony Award-winning 'Barnum' to be presented

"Barnum," the Tony Award-winning Broadway musical based on the life of P.T. Barnum, will be presented at 3 p.m., Sunday, Feb. 16 in Caldwell Auditorium.

The performance is sponsored by UT Tyler's Friends of the Arts and produced by Big League Theatricals of New York in association with the Pegasus Players of Chicago. General admission tickets are \$8; faculty, staff and students may purchase tickets for \$4 by calling the Office of Development, ext. 7110.

Winner of three Tony Awards, "Barnum" has been acclaimed by noted critic Earl Wilson as "the greatest family entertainment in the world."

The production traces the career of America's greatest showman from 1835 to the year he joined with James A. Bailey to form The Greatest Show on Earth. Self-proclaimed prince of "the noble art of humbug," Barnum juggled a life of flamboyant showmanship and illusion-making against the more respectable career of a clockmaker his wife preferred that he pursue.

With music by Cy Coleman and lyrics by Michael Stewart, "Barnum" is filled with ear-catching tunes — from ballads to marches to ragtime — that propel the story along in exhilarating three-ring circus style.

Layton to help develop environmental program

Robert E. "Bob" Layton, Jr., immediate past regional administrator of the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Region 6, in Dallas, has accepted a new EPA assignment to assist UT Tyler in developing an environmental education curriculum.

Layton, who served as mayor of Tyler from 1975-1976, was cofounder of Layton Engineering Company. Also, he served on the city council from 1974-1976. In 1987, he was appointed regional administrator of the EPA's Region 6 which encompasses Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana and New Mexico. In this position he was responsible for directing the federal environmental program in the five-state region.

"Higher education has an important responsibility in helping formulate reasonable strategies and policies in order to address the challenges of global environmental interdependency. The experience of Bob Layton as regional administrator of EPA and his background in the private sector will enhance relationships of business, industry, education and the federal government. I am delighted the EPA has selected UT Tyler for this pilot program," President George F. Hamm stated.

While in Dallas Layton established a regional Environmental Technology Transfer and Research Institute at UT Arlington. This institute compiles the latest technological information from universities and industry and shares it to make the latest technologies available for practical application.

A professional engineer, he received his bachelor of science degree in aeronautical engineering at Texas A&M University. Layton spent eight years on the Texas State Board of Registration for Professional Engineers, serving two years as chairman. As a member of the National Council of Engineering Examiners, he was chairman of the committee which authored a law enforcement manual still used by the engineering licensing boards of all 50 states.
