Major gift boosts Liberal Arts Complex

A gift of \$250,000 has been donated by Houston Endowment Inc. to UT Tyler for its new Liberal Arts Complex and Center for the Arts, giving the \$18.2 million project a major boost toward completion of funding, President George F. Hamm has announced.

Earlier this year, Mrs. Jacqueline Braithwaite of Tyler made a \$500,000 donation to the project. Other recent donations include a pledge of \$50,000 from NationsBank.

The Liberal Arts Complex and Center for the Arts is to be funded by a \$12 million allocation from the proceeds of the Permanent University Fund (PUF), while \$6 million is to be raised through private gifts. The facility will accommodate growing demands for enhanced academic offerings in arts, music, drama, and speech, and will include a general-use auditorium, theatre, recital hall and an art gallery. C/A Architects of Houston and Longview has designed the complex.

Additionally, a private developer is scheduled to begin construction in August of a \$5.2 million student apartment complex that will house 340 students on the UT Tyler campus. Century Development of Houston will construct and manage the complex pursuant to a long-term ground lease with the university.

British comedy to be performed

"Habeas Corpus," Alan Bennett's witty British comedy, will be presented by UT Tyler 's summer theatre program June 24 - 28. Complimentary tickets for faculty and staff are available by calling ext. 7253.

A preview performance, to be presented under rehearsal conditions, is scheduled at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, June 24. Regular performances will be 7:30 p.m. Thursday and Friday, June 25 - 26; 2 p.m. Saturday, June 27; and at 2 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. Sunday, June 28. All performances will be held in ADM 127.

Dr. Andrew Szarka, associate professor of history, will play the leading role of Arthur Wicksteed, M.D. — the role played by Alec Guiness in the original British production. Wicksteed, at age 53, feels that life is passing him by, and his attitudes fire the madcap events in the play.

The ensemble cast also includes James Johnson, Mary Lewis, Debbie Hoover, Michael Gorham, Kara Rainer, Kevin McDonald, Linda Sanders, Gaynor Edwards, Michael Prewitt, Micah Strickland, Julie Marsh and Jere Hunter.

The production is directed and designed by Dr. James A. Hatfield, assistant professor and director of theatre. Mary Ellen Wright, a recent graduate, is the play's assistant director and Linda Stanford is stage manager.
