Art lecture to be presented Nov. 30

Dr. Beverly Brown of the Kimball Art Museum will discuss "The Paintings of Giambattista Tiepolo" at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 30 in LIB 401. Presented by Friends of the Arts and the Department of Art, the lecture is free to faculty, staff and students.

Brown is assistant director of programs and academic services/curator of exhibitions at the Kimball Museum in Fort Worth. Prior to this position she was curator of southern baroque painting at the National Gallery of Art, where she also served as research curator of European painting, curator of Italian Renaissance painting and senior research associate of the Center for Advanced Study in the Visual Arts.

Brown has taught at Georgetown, Princeton and Harvard universities. She received a Ph.D. from Northwestern University.

M.S. degree in biology approved

A master of science degree program in biology has been approved by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

The M.S. degree in biology will be a 36-hour thesis-based program requiring a minimum of 30 semester hours of graduate coursework and a sixhour thesis.

A research oriented degree, the program will provide students the opportunity to be involved in original scientific inquiry.

The program is designed to serve science teachers in the public schools and junior colleges, allowing teachers employed in the East Texas region to upgrade their skills; to increase the number of laboratory science personnel, including researchers at health centers and state agencies; and to prepare students for doctoral level study in biology.
