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

## State Employee Charitable Campaign debuts

The new State Employee Charitable Campaign debuts this fall with two important features never offered before to university employees.



## TOGETHER WE CARE

For the first time, employees may make charitable contributions by having their donations deducted conveniently from their pay checks each month. At the same time, employees still have the option of making contributions in cash, check or by bank draft.

Secondly, in addition to United Way agencies of Tyler/Smith County, university employees are offered a larger number of charitable organizations at the local, state and national levels to which they may make contributions. With more than 200 charitable organizations participating at the statewide and local level, the State Employee Charitable Campaign gives employees a variety of charities from which to choose.

When state employees choose a participating organization, they can be sure that the organization is legitimate and will use the contributions wisely and effectively. Participation in the State Employees Charitable Campaign is voluntary and confidential.

"Together We Care" is the theme for this year's State Employee Charitable Campaign. UT Tyler's campus campaign begins Oct. 4.

Mellon Professor in the Humanities at Boston University and the author of more than 30 books.

Sculptor Joe Barrington will discuss his work and conduct a workshop during his visit to campus Oct. 5 - 7. Karl Kilinski, professor of art history at Southern Methodist University, will give a guest lecture at 7 p.m. Oct. 10 in LIB 401.

Art exhibitions in the University Gallery, UC 101, include paintings by Heather Ryan Kelley through Oct. 28, works by UT Tyler art faculty members Nov. 7 - 23 and works by senior art students Nov. 28 - Dec. 16.

The UT Tyler Theatre Repertory Ensemble Company opens its season with "Dear Liar" Oct. 20 followed by the premiere of "Oleanna" Nov. 3 and "You Never Can Tell" Nov. 11.

"Dear Liar" by Jerome Kilty is a witty romance in prose between playwright George Bernard Shaw and actress Mrs. Patrick Campbell.

"Oleanna" by Pulitizer Prize-winning author David Mamet was performed on Broadway in New York City in 1993. "You Never Can Tell" is another Shaw play, written in 1897 to be performed in a London West End theatre. All three plays will be presented in repertory during the fall semester.

The Tyler Youth Orchestra will be hosted by the Department of Music at 3 p.m. Oct. 30 in the University Center. Music ensembles of UT Tyler will perform in December: the Chamber Orchestra will be in concert Dec. 3 at First Presbyterian Church; the Concert Choir and Orchestra will perform Dec. 8 at Glenwood United Methodist.
