Distinguished Lecture Series announced

Nobel Peace Prize recipient and Holocaust survivor Elie Wiesel will open the 1994 - 95 Distinguished Lecture Series on Oct. 5, President George F. Hamm has announced. The lecture is scheduled at 8 p.m. in the University Center.


Wiesel will be followed by General Brent Scowcroft, national security advisor to President Bush, on Nov. 1 and Hugh Downs, host of ABC News' prime-time weekly news magazine program "20/20," on March 8.

Complimentary tickets are available to faculty in each dean's office; staff may pick up free tickets in the Office of News and Information/Public Affairs.


A first-hand witness of the Holocaust, Wiesel has used his talents as an author and teacher to defend human rights throughout the world. Wiesel also has earned the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the U.S. Congressional Gold Medal and the Medal of Liberty Award. He is the Andrew W. Mellon Professor in the Humanities at Boston University and author of more than 30 books.

Scowcroft is the only person to have served two presidents as national security advisor. From 1974 - 77, Scowcroft advised President Ford as the U.S. extricated itself from Vietnam and opened relations with China. In 1989, he returned to the White House as President Bush presided over the end of the Cold War, the mounting of Operation Desert Storm, and negotiations in two historic arms control agreements.

Downs provides commentary for reports on "20/20" and goes into the field to develop news features and profile important personalities. In 1962 he began a nine-year career as host of NBC News' "Today" program. While at NBC he also was host of the popular daytime game series "Concentration" and reporter/narrator for a number of documentaries and specials. He is recipient of two Emmy Awards.

- **Dr. Gregory P. Orvis**, assistant professor of criminal justice. Orvis has taught at the University of Alabama and the University of Houston. An attorney, he received a J.D. from Tulane University and a Ph.D. from the University of Houston.
- **Dr. Rosaline Olade**, *visiting associate professor of nursing.* Olade previously was medical program review specialist at Glendale Long Term Care Center, Phoenix, Ariz. She holds a Ph.D. from the University of Ibadan, Nigeria and was a post-doctoral scholar at the University of Pennsylvania.
- **Dr. A.M. Shajaat Ali**, assistant professor of geography. Ali has served as a visiting professor at Oklahoma State University and earned a Ph.D. in geography from Clark University in Massachusetts.
