Baker appointed VP for academic affairs

Dr. W.A. "Bill" Baker Jr. has been appointed vice president for academic affairs, President George F. Hamm has announced.

Baker, a professor of chemistry at UT Arlington, served as vice president for academic affairs from 1973 to 1993 and as dean of the graduate school from 1971 to 1973. During his service as vice president, UT Arlington added 49 new degree programs at the baccalaureate, masters and doctoral levels and grew from 14,000 to 25,000 students. Also the university added a School of Architecture and Environmental Design, the Automation and Robotics Research Institute in the College of Engineering, a School of Nursing, and the Center for Professional Teacher Education.

"Dr. Baker's background as vice president of a university experiencing enormous growth in enrollment and academic degree programs, and his service with the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board assessing the role and scope of junior colleges and senior colleges, will be invaluable for UT Tyler in addressing the higher educational needs of the entire East Texas region," Hamm stated.

Baker's appointment is effective June 1. He will fill the position held by Dr. Vincent Falzone, who has served as interim vice president for academic affairs since last May. Falzone will resume his responsibilities as professor of history.

Baker began his academic career at Syracuse University as an assistant professor of chemistry in 1959. He later attained the rank of professor and served as department chairman from 1965 to 1971. He earned a B.S. degree in chemistry, summa cum laude, from Texas A&I-Kingsville and a Ph.D. in chemistry from UT Austin. Baker has conducted sponsored research for the National Science Foundation, the National Institute of Health, the Air Force Office of Scientific Research, the Petroleum Research Fund, Research Corporation, and Welch Foundation.

He has authored articles in numerous academic journals, including the *Journal of the American Chemical Society, Inorganic Chemistry, Inorganica Chimica Acta, Journal of Inorganic and Nuclear Chemistry* and *Journal of Organometallic Chemistry*.

He is a member of several academic honor societies and professional organizations, including Alpha Chi Sigma, Phi Lambda Upsilon, Sigma Xi, American Chemical Society and Phi Delta Kappa.

His community service includes extensive involvement with the American Heart Association, serving on the State Board of Directors from 1978-1988 and as board chairman in 1983-1984. Baker received the Eisenhower Award as Lay Volunteer of the Year in 1986.

UTSA to conduct teaching survey

A survey of 24,000 students, faculty and administrators at UT System components will be conducted in March as part of a project to review issues related to the evaluation of teaching. The project is directed by Arthur Hernandez, an assistant professor of educational psychology at UT San Antonio, and graduate student Shirley Jean Schmidt.

The survey, which is part of a project of the UT System Faculty Advisory Council, has the support of Chancellor William H. Cunningham. The survey questionnaires will collect information about how each campus evaluates and rewards teaching, and will solicit on key evaluation issues. The study also seeks to determine if students, instructors and administrators believe university teaching is appropriately valued.

Surveys will be distributed to all tenured and tenure-track teaching faculty, all academic administrators, and approximately 10 percent of students on each UT System campus. Distribution is expected to begin in mid-March. All completed surveys will be routed to Hernandez at UTSA for processing and analysis. Hernandez says he expects the final report, which will include survey findings, will be completed by fall. For more information contact Hernandez at (210) 691-4350.
