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

Distinguished Lecture Series announced

Jack Kemp, past congressman and cabinet member, will open the 1995-96 Distinguished Lecture Series on Oct. 31, President George F. Hamm has announced. Cokie Roberts, ABC News special correspondent, will speak Jan. 30 and Bill Moyers, award-winning broadcaster, will complete the series March 7.

Kemp, one of the nation's key spokesmen for growth and opportunity, was named chairman of the National Commission on Economic Growth and Tax Reform in March 1995. He serves on the board of directors of Empower America, a public policy and advocacy organization he co-founded in 1993 with William Bennett, Jeane Kirkpatrick, and Vin Weber.



Roberts covers politics, Congress, and public policy as special correspondent for ABC News. She is a regular member of the weekly roundtable discussion of "This Week with David Brinkley" and often serves as substitute anchor on "Nightline." In addition to her work in television news, she serves as a news analyst for National Public Radio. She is recipient of the Edward R. Murrow Award, the highest award in public radio, and was the first broadcast journalist to win the prestigious Everett McKinley Dirksen Award for coverage of Congress.

Moyers has been executive editor of the highly acclaimed series "Bill Moyers' Journal," senior news analyst for "CBS Evening News," and chief correspondent for "CBS Reports," and is the recipient of more than 20 Emmy Awards. He served as deputy director of the Peace Corps in the Kennedy Administration and as special assistant to President Lyndon Johnson. His books include Healing and the Mind, a recent #1 national bestseller, and The Language of Life, comprised of conversations

with 34 American poets and the basis of a PBS series.

Literary East Texas exhibit on view

Literary East Texas, an exhibition of photographs honoring East Texas writers, is on

view now through Oct. 21 in UC 134. Presented by the UT Tyler Student Association, the exhibit is provided by the Texas Humanities Resource Center.

Created to honor the work of 25 authors who have lived in and written about the eastern half of the state, Literary East Texas features photographs by East Texas photographer Nell Blakely. Blakely's images, taken especially for the exhibit, illustrate specific passages from the writers' works. The 25 authors were selected from more than 200 East Texas writers and reflect all types of literature: children's books, historical novels, non-fiction, and intensely poetical reminiscences of the impact which life in East Texas had upon the creative processes.

Literary East Texas is designed to encourage readers to discover and rediscover writers of the region, to match the words of these authors with photographs of the people and landscape they described, and to honor representative writers of the region.

Both a pictorial and literary record of the social and industrial changes that have taken place in East Texas, the exhibit shows how Texas has changed from mule-

drawn wagons and cotton blossoms, to oil rigs, to skyscrapers. The exhibit also portrays the varied geography of East Texas, from the Gulf Coast through the Piney Woods to the bottom lands of the Red River.

Theatre season opens Oct. 20

Performances have been scheduled for the 1995-96 repertory theatre season, featuring the theme "Very French." Plays represent themes of passion and/or marital relationships in works of both comedy and tragedy. Four plays are by French playwrights and one is English.

"Three Courteline's," three short plays by Georges Courteline, will open Oct. 20 and be performed in revolving repertory format through Dec. 3.

"Lettice and Lovage," a Tony Award winning play by Peter Shaffer opens in November and will be performed in revolving repertory through Dec. 10. Racine's "Phaedra" opens in January.


in the spotlight . . .

Dr. Michael Murphy, associate professor of English, and **James Pace**, associate professor and Department of Art chair, will give a slide and poetry presentation at the International Conference of the Sacred and the Profane in Literature and the Visual Arts Oct. 19 in Atlanta, Ga. Topic of their presentation is the collaborative work "Beyond Ourselves," a collection of paintings and poems over a year in the making.

Dr. James Schwane, professor and Department of Health and Kinesiology chair, presented a research paper on "Is Plasma Creatine Kinase Hyperresponse to Eccentric Exercise a Consistent Response?" at the Third International Olympic Committee World Congress on Sport Sciences Sept. 21 in Atlanta. The paper was co-authored by the late Jeanie Spencer, a graduate of the M.S. degree program in clinical exercise physiology.

Brenda Walling and Dr. Peggy Wolfe, assistant professors of education, and Ginny Fender, lecturer in curriculum and instruction, conducted a summer camp in math, social studies, and reading at Dogan Middle School in conjunction with on-campus teacher education classes. UT Tyler students developed integrated math and social studies units and taught the units to incoming Dogan students.
