Palestine Nursing Program Awarded Grant

UT Tyler has been awarded a grant of \$20,000 from the Union Pacific Foundation for the growth and development of the university's extension program for nursing in Palestine, President George F. Hamm announced.

"This generous gift from the Union Pacific Foundation will assist UT Tyler in facilitating the delivery of quality health care to the East Texas region. The university's nursing program prepares nurses with the knowledge and skills to help meet the critical need for health care professionals in the community," Hamm said.

The grant was awarded to UT Tyler by Union Pacific Foundation and its operating companies, the Union Pacific Railroad Company and Union Pacific Resources, Inc., to expand the facilities and services for medical education through the university's satellite campus at Trinity Valley Medical Center in Palestine.

The nursing program utilizes Interactive Video technology between classrooms at UT Tyler and Palestine, on-site instruction by UT Tyler Division of Nursing faculty, and clinical experiences in the Palestine area.

UT Tyler offered its baccalaureate nursing program in Palestine for the first time in the 1995 fall semester.

Forty-five students are enrolled in the first two semesters of the nursing program this spring.

Mark Anderson, a nursing major at UT Tyler, has been elected president of the Texas Student Nurses Association (TSNA) for 1996 - 97, Dr. Marian Rowe, associate professor of nursing and UT Tyler Student Nurses Association advisor, has announced.

Anderson, a Tyler resident, was elected at the 4,000-member association's state meeting held recently in Dallas.

In addition, the UT Tyler Student Nurses Association has been awarded a certificate by the Texas League for Nursing in recognition of its initiative in developing a communitybased influenza immunization program for senior citizens.

The program, funded by a National League for Nursing grant awarded to Dr. Carolyn Harvey, assistant professor of nursing, was administered by community nursing students under the direction of UT Tyler Division of Nursing faculty. More than 1200 persons in the East Texas region were immunized through the program last year.

Savings bonds campaign underway

"Today's Decision, Tomorrow's Security" is the theme for this year's U.S. Savings Bonds Campaign. President George F. Hamm has designated April 15 - 29 for the 1996 U.S. Savings Bonds Campaign at UT Tyler.

The semi-annual market-based rate for Series EE Bonds issued between Nov. 1, 1995 and April 30 is 4.75 percent. That rate is 85 percent of the average of six-month Treasury security yields. Competitive interest rates that follow the economy are only one reason to buy bonds. Other reasons include:

- U.S. Savings Bonds offer tax advantages in that accumulated interest is deferred until the bond is redeemed or until it reaches final maturity.
- U.S. Savings Bonds provide tax-free interest when used to finance higher education.
- Savings Bonds are safe and secure. They are backed by the United States of America, and are replaced free if lost or stolen.
- U. S. Savings Bonds can be purchased in various denominations monthly or bi-monthly through the Payroll Savings Plan at no additional cost to you.

Peggy Emery, coordinator of personnel services, is UT Tyler's campaign chair. To purchase savings bonds automatically, please complete a payroll authorization card and return it to the Personnel Office.

TRS update: beneficiary designation

It is important to keep your Teacher Retirement System beneficiary designation up-todate. Members of the Teacher Retirement system are automatically covered by valuable financial protections that will be paid to the primary beneficiary upon the member's death.

Two examples of death benefits are: 1. An active member's beneficiary receives a lump sum payment of two times the annual salary up to a maximum of \$80,000. 2. A retired employee's beneficiary would receive a lump sum payment of \$10,000. With such significant benefits, a member should keep the primary beneficiary properly identified at TRS. Upon a member's or retiree's death, TRS will pay benefits to the beneficiary most recently designated, even if, for example, the beneficiary is a former spouse.
