Cokie Roberts, ABC News special correspondent, will be presented Jan. 30 in the Distinguished Lecture Series, President George F. Hamm has announced. Roberts will speak at 8 p.m. in the UT Tyler University Center.

Roberts covers politics, Congress, and public policy as special correspondent for ABC News. She is a regular member of the weekly roundtable discussion of "This Week with David Brinkley" and often serves as substitute anchor on "Nightline."

In addition to her work in television news, Roberts serves as a news analyst for National Public Radio where she was the Congressional correspondent for more than 10 years. She is recipient of the Edward R. Murrow Award, the highest award in public radio, and was the first broadcast journalist to win the prestigious Everett McKinley Dirksen Award for coverage of Congress.



Dr. Shajaat Ali, assistant professor of geography, has published an article, "Population Pressure, Environmental Constraints and Agricultural Change: Examples from Three Agroecosystems," in the journal *Agriculture, Ecosystems & Environment*.

Engineering scholarship campaign begins

A campaign to raise \$200,000 to fund scholarships for students in the proposed new engineering program has been launched at UT Tyler, President George F. Hamm announced.

Chairing the fundraising committee, on behalf of UT Tyler's development board, are James H. Reynolds, chairman of the board of Reynolds & Kay, Inc., and B. G. Hartley, president and chief executive officer of Southside State Bank. Chairman of the development board is A. W. "Dub" Riter, Jr.

"For the new engineering program to be successful, we must identify and recruit the top students from this region and beyond. To be competitive with other universities seeking these students, we need to provide scholarships of at least \$1,000 per student per year. While the Texas Legislature appropriated start-up funds for the engineering program, funds for scholarships must come from individuals and companies in the private sector," Hamm stated.

EARNED INCOME TAX CREDIT

Was your family's income last year less than \$26,673? If so, you may be entitled to an income tax refund of \$3,110.

John Sharp, Texas comptroller of public accounts, is the spokesperson for the Earned Income Credit (EIC) campaign which helps families get the dollars they deserve. The EIC is a refund to qualified taxpayers - even if you don't owe any taxes on your income. Each year it brings more than a billion federal income tax dollars back into the Texas economy.

You may qualify if your family earned less than \$24,396 in adjusted gross income in 1995 and you had a child living with you for more than six months of the year. If you had two or more children living with you, you may qualify even if your family income was as high as \$26,673, If you have no qualifying children and a family income of less than \$9,230 you still qualify.
