Smith also serves as director/institutional safety officer for the UT Health Center Department of Safety, Health and Environmental Services. Smith, who holds M.S. and B.S. degrees from UT Tyler, is experienced in implementing safety policies and performing product safety assessments, regulatory standards reviews, and accident investigation and documentation.



Risk assessment: small departments

(Note: this is third in a series on internal control issues)

In small departments, it is often difficult to separate duties. To compensate for this problem, some of the following actions could be taken:

Place greater emphasis on monitoring.

Use a temporary employee to do one of the key functions, such as reconciling. (This could be one day a month, which is worth the price if it prevents a loss.)

Require employees to take vacation.

Use the dean's office as a level of separation if feasible.

Use the information system to analyze activities.

Make sure cash transactions are recorded ASAP.

Make sure that checks are restrictively endorsed upon receipt.

Remember, trust should not prevent a manager from separating duties. Often it is the longtime, trusted employee who commits fraud because he/she knows the system and how to circumvent it.
