Fall theatre season opens Friday

UT Tyler's Theatre Repertory Ensemble Company will celebrate the Roman and Italian influence in theatre with its 1996 - 97 season, according to Dr. James Hatfield, director of theatre and associate professor of theatre.

The theme for the season is Roman Renaissance featuring selected plays that represent Italian reflections of legend, literature, love, language, and laughter.

The fall season opener "Octavia," by Seneca, portrays the Roman emperor Nero's ruthless effort to replace his wife, Octavia, even if he has to change Roman laws to make it possible. This may be the earliest surviving play dealing with current political issues. Seneca, whose work influenced the likes of William Shakespeare, used man's cruelty to man in a Roman world to urge other men to behave more rationally in times to come.

Scheduled performances are Oct. 11 - 13 and 24 - 26 at 7:30 p.m.; and Oct. 13 and 27 at 3 p.m.

Nicholas Wright's "Mrs. Klein" depicts several days in the life of controversial therapist, Melanie Klein. Klein's theories about children's psyches and her unorthodox research based in part on her own children shook the foundations of the psychoanalytical community in London in the years preceding World War II. The Tony-nominated play deals with the unexplained death of Klein's adult son and the rivalry between her daughter and an avid follower of her analytical methods.

Scheduled performances are Nov. 2, 15 - 16 and 22 - 23 at 7:30 p.m.; Nov. 3, 17 and 24 at 3 p.m.

Hatfield will direct both productions. Complimentary tickets for faculty, staff and students are available from the Department of Theatre and Communication, HPR 272, ext. 7253.

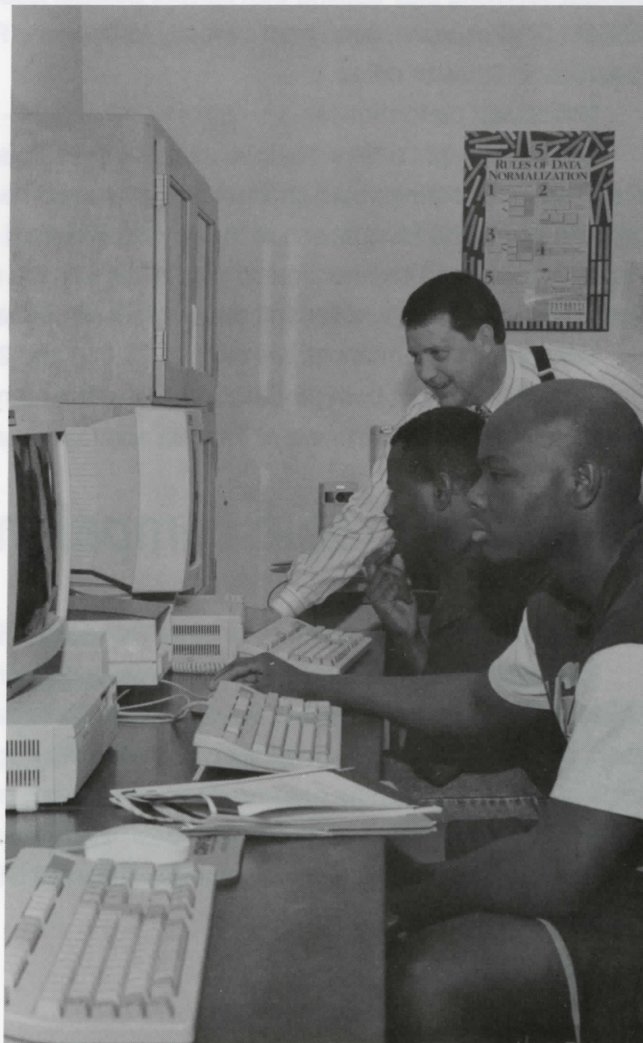
TJC HPE center open to UT Tyler faculty, staff

Dr. Rosaline Olade, associate professor of nursing, presented "The Nurse Scientist Program" at the National Institute of Health July 22 -26 in Washington, D.C. and "Chaos in Health Care Delivery: the Survival of Nursing" to the Texas Nurses Association, District 19, Aug. 8 in Rusk. Also, she had a paper, "Nursing Education and Administration in Nigeria: Progress and Challenges," published in the June issue of *Journal of Nursing Administration*.

Dr. Timothy Dolan, assistant professor of political science, presented "Patterns of Activities and Attitudes towards the AmeriCorps Model of Youth Service by East Texas High School Seniors" at the American Political Science Association meeting Sept. 1 in San Francisco.
