Distinguished Lecture Series Announced

David Gergen, an advisor to four U.S. Presidents, will open the 1998-99 Distinguished Lecture Series of UT Tyler on Nov. 19, President Rodney H. Mabry announced. The series, now in its 17th year, continues in the spring with Shimon Peres, former Prime Minister of Israel on Feb. 24 and political analyst and columnist George Stephanopoulos on April 1.

All lectures will begin at 8 p.m. in the university's Cowan Center.

This year's series, Mabry said, is being coordinated by Dr. George F. Hamm, who initiated the Distinguished Lecture Series as president of UT Tyler in 1982.

Gergen has served in the White House as an advisor to Presidents Nixon, Ford, Reagan and Clinton. Most recently, he served for 18 months in the Clinton administration, first as Counselor to the President and then as Special Advisor to the President and the Secretary of State. He returned to private life in January, 1995.

He currently serves as editor-at-large at U.S. News & World Report and as regular contributor on the PBS NewsHour with Jim Lehrer. Also, he is writing a book on presidential leadership in the late 20th century. He has been a visiting professor at Duke University and this spring will join the faculty at Harvard University as a professor of public service in the John F. Kennedy School of Government.

Peres joined the ranks of the world's most renowned peacemakers when he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1994 for his efforts as a major initiator of the historic peace agreement between Israel and the PLO in 1993 and then with Jordan in 1994.

In 1996 he initiated the creation and establishment of the Peres Institute for Peace.

Stephanopoulos became one of the most visible presidential assistants in recent American history as the Senior Advisor to the President for Policy and Strategy. He was a key strategist in both Clinton campaigns and was involved in the development of virtually all major policy initiatives during President Clinton's first term in office.

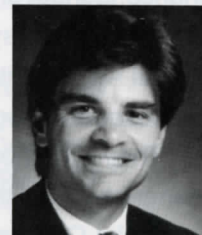
He is now a visiting professor at the School of International and Public Affairs at Columbia University, a political analyst for ABC News and a correspondent for Newsweek.

UT Tyler Campus Health Clinic Opens

UT Tyler, in conjunction with the UT Health Center at Tyler, has opened the UT Tyler Campus Health Clinic, according to UT Tyler President Rodney H. Mabry.

The clinic is located in the UT Tyler Science Building, room 224. Clinic hours are 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

"Primary care services will be provided, with referrals outside the clinic when warranted," said Dr. Linda Klotz, dean of the UT Tyler School of Nursing. "The clinic will be staffed by nurse practitioner faculty, with physicians from UTHCT on site Tuesday and Thursday afternoons. The same physicians will be available each week."

Services also include preventive care, health and wellness education, monitoring and management of chronic health problems and health risk appraisals.

The clinic, which will be open to all UT Tyler faculty, staff, students and their dependents, is sponsored by the UT Health Center at Tyler. Patients may make appointments; however, walk-ins are welcome.
